CRATER LAKE IN WINTER TIME (Continued From Page Four) holding every step and still not sticking. After I made the first turn of the grade I received a sample of what it was like up on the flat. The wind took a side swipe at me and brought me to my knees, but the referee didn't get a chance to say one before I was up on my feet. At each south exposure of the grade I received the same treatment. The wind growing stronger as I neared the top. Where the road swings around the hill above the pump house I made three switchbacks and was at the edge of the flat, and from the shelter of a tree. I looked toward the Lodge, a faint outline of it would appear for an instant and then disappear. A half a mile of Hell! Could I stand up? I took the heel straps off my skis and started. I hadn't underestimated it a bit. It was Hell and then some. It was a lucky thing that I had removed the heelstraps for I was no sooner down than I was up again. One moment I was blinded by the snow whipped in my eyes by the wind and the next I was piled in the ditch. The frozen particles of crust cut like a knife and my face was bleeding in several places. One thing I didn't need sight to follow direction, the wind was blowing me toward the rim. I was out on that flat for half a lifetime, and every atom of atmosphere in the universe passed by me and as it went it gave me a dig. As I neared the Lodge I thought of the snowpoid and I turned to the left toward the timber. The wind now got a side swipe at me and how it did burn my face and ears. I took the depth of the snow at the pole, 72 in., and made for the Lodge. At the top of the drift I took off my skis and rolled down the side. How the wind was coming across the end of the building! No chance to stand up so I crawled to the door. Now stop and think what would have happened if on leaving the Lodge I had locked the door; but I had wired it shut and had let a loop in the wire so that I wouldn't have to take off my mittens to get it unwrapped. The door opened, I stood up, and the wind helped me to get in. I piked myself up, cleaned off my skis and went upstairs to see if I could start a fire. I copied the temperature from the thermometer, punched the clock and made myself at home. Weather - Day cloudy; wind southwest; snowfall since last observation 7 in.; snow on ground 72 in.; precipitation 0.71 in.; temp., H. 33, L. 21, R. 14, M. 28.
