HEAVY GUARD PLACED ON D'AUTREMONT
 (Continued from Page 1)

"I nearly fainted," the prisoner told his captors here, "but I laughed it off, saying lots of people look alike."

There was an affair with a woman here in Manila and this may have had something to do with D'Autremont's arrest. The soldier met a pretty Santa Ana cabaret girl of the type known as "Ballarina." The two, unmarried, lived together for some time. Authorities are trying to locate the girl, but will not say whether D'Autremont told her of the Oregon crimes.

When imprisoned here, D'Autremont threatened to commit suicide.

"I suppose lots of fellows kill themselves when they get in

scrapes like this," he said.

Regains Composure
 But the prisoner regained his composure and asked for civilian clothes, which were furnished.

The "tip" that brought about D'Autremont's capture has been kept secret. It is credited to an "informant," but this is as far as postal authorities will go in discussing it.

Tracking D'Autremont was all the more difficult because he never wrote to his parents or acquaintances. He never attempted any disguise and even continued the same method of combing his hair.

After taken into custody, however, D'Autremont, who is only 22 years old, asked about his mother and father and was eager to know if his brothers, Roy and Ray, accused also of participation in the Oregon holdup, had been captured.

D'Autremont is due to leave heavy guard, on the transport here for San Francisco, under Thomas, Wednesday.
