DENVER NEWSPAPERS FURNISH FREE GAS

War Over Classified Advertising Results in One-Two-Two Benefit

DENVER, Feb. 16. — (UN)—With more than 25,000 gallons of free gasoline in their tanks, and prospects of an even bigger amount tomorrow, Denver motorists were preparing tonight for week end trips at the expense of local newspapers.

Meanwhile a gasoline war between rival newspaper publishers, which had thrilled the entire state, continued unabated with everybody "sitting tight."

Denver's gasoline spree, growing out of competition for classified advertising supremacy, reached its height during the noon hour and at dinner hour this

evening, when police had to clear the streets in front of the office of the Rocky Mountain News, and Denver Evening News, where hundreds of want ad customers were clamoring for a chance to place Sunday classified advertisements and secure in return a free ticket good for five gallons of gasoline.

Gas is retailing here at 21 cents a gallon. Meanwhile the Denver Post and Morning Post, opposition papers, were giving four gallons of gasoline per ad to far smaller crowds.

Today's gasoline orgy was the latest development in a newspaper war of probably unparalleled intensity, which developed after the Scripps Howard interests purchased the Rocky Mountain News and Denver Times and merged the latter with the Denver Express into a new newspaper the Denver Evening News.




