"Oy, Mr. Ricketts, Mr. Ricketts," cried one with the jaws and complexion of a bloodhound.
"Tex, old boy, it's Andy," whined another, squatting beneath the "No Admittance" sign with a resigned air.
From a distant corridor came a sudden shout. Rickard had escaped through a wide entrance and was legging it down the stairs as if the sheriff of Goldfield were after him.
The bulge in the fleeing promoter's pocket did not denote tickets for the coming fight. It was his lunch, which he eats on the run as he scurries from place to place, knowing no rest, no peace, because more than 50,000 persons want to get into his new Garden next Friday night, and there is room for only 19,203.

Washington News Letter

WASHINGTON — Theodore F. Shuey, official reporter in the Senate, who has been reporting senatorial speeches for 59 years, sometimes has his troubles in taking down the utterances of statesman word for word.
When Shuey has nightmares, he dreams of the late Senator James A. Clarke of Arkansas.
"He was a terror," Shuey says. "He made fine speeches, but he went so fast that they lost their effect. It was mighty hard to take him down. He went over 200 words a minute and his diction wasn't clear enough to permit it."
The present champion oratorical sprinter of the Senate, Shuey says, is Peter Norbeck of South Dakota. The official reporters thank heaven that Norbeck speaks on few occasions, for he talks about 225 words a minute and is the hardest man to "get" of the current senatorial crop.
Clarke, however, remains most vividly in Shuey's long memory. "Mr. Moses of New Hampshire has the clearest diction of them all," chuckles Shuey. "He's just delightful. He goes up to 180 words a minute, but he has that wonderful fluency that we used to hear from John T. Morgan of Alabama.
"Mr. Robinson of Arkansas is almost as clear as Mr. Moses and Mr. Borah is almost as clear as Mr. Robinson. Mr. Robinson talks about 185 words a minute and Mr. Borah goes about 150."
Yet Senator James A. Reed of Missouri is the favorite orator of this 82-year-old man who has heard more senators more often than anyone else. Borah he regards as the finest orator on the Republican side. Reed often goes down to 140 words a minute, Shuey says.
"He's very clear, and really the most delightful man in the Senate to listen to," declares Shuey. They all talk faster—and make it harder for the reporters—when they snap at each other. "Our hardest job," one is assured.
Shuey has observed that nobody can hold the galleries like Tom Healin of Alabama, who orates at about 150 words a minute.
Carter Glass has very clear diction and speaks at about Borah's speed. Swanson, whether he has the gifts of oratory or not, has an effective earnestness which Shuey believes counts a great deal. Swanson hits 180 words a minute.
