### GOVERNMENT THROUGH IN DAUGHERTY CASE

**Head of Indians Bank Testimony Helps the Defense Case**

NEW YORK, Feb. 17.—(UN)—United States Attorney Emory R. Buckner this afternoon rested the government's case against Harry M. Daugherty, former attorney general, and Thomas W. Miller, former alien property custodian, charged with conspiring to defraud the United States of their unbiased services. In his second day on the stand for the prosecution, Mal S. Daugherty, president of the Midland National Bank of Washington Courthouse, Ohio, gave testimony more favorable to the defense than to the government's case. The missing bank records of Harry M. Daugherty and Jesse W. Smith, which the government contends would show that Daugherty and Miller accept a share of a \$441,000 bribe paid to the late John T. King by Richard Merton, German steel magnate, were at one time available to the government but it did not use them, Mal testified.

### FEW YANKS HAVE SIGNED CONTRACT

NEW YORK, Feb. 17.—(UN)—The pennant which the New York Yanks won in 1926 has yet to be paid for. Like Sam Broadon, whose Cardinals are sending in their bills for season's and post-season's victories, Colonel Jake Ruppert is faced with the spectacle of an unsigned ball club, and one which wants a lot more money than it was paid in 1926.
