HIGH SCHOOL NOTES

A special election was held Wednesday afternoon, to vote on some proposed amendments to the A. H. S. constitution. The first amendment read as follows: All lettermen, with the exception of basketball lettermen, shall be authorized to wear a white service stripe on the left sleeve of the sweater for each competitive year. Basketball lettermen shall be authorized to wear a red service stripe on a white background on the left sleeve of the sweater for each competitive year and the letter may be outlined in white felt.

Second amendment: Any man playing 120 minutes, in at least five games against high school or college teams of recognized rank, may be awarded the official emblem. Any man meeting the editors shall have the power of full years may be awarded the official emblem.

Third amendment: Each spring an editor shall be elected for the Rogue annual, and another as editor of the Rogue News.
