United States, Great Britain & Japan May Join Together

the world as naval power and the world is controlled today not by armies but by its navies. Sea power is the predominant force, a fact which was first pointed out by an American, the late Admiral Mahan, and has since won the approval of the world's leading strategists. It was sea power which allowed America to send her troops across the Atlantic in the world war; it was sea power which isolated Germany and prevented her getting food stuffs and raw materials during the progress of the conflict; it was sea power which destroyed the Spanish armada and crushed Spain; it was sea power which enabled Japan to defeat Russia and maintain her lines of communications from her home base to Manchuria; it was sea power prevented Napoleon from invading Britain and permitted the British to send their troops across the channel to defeat Napoleon at Waterloo.

Always the final word in great wars is spoken by warships. So, as the United States, Japan, and Great Britain, the three leading powers of the sea, are actuated by a similar naval policy, they eventually will have their way. As long as they can cooperate in naval plans, they will inevitably develop an intimacy among themselves not share by the other nations. The present trend of events, therefore, suggests that the logic of events may now have in the making a tripartite entente, created by these three leading powers of the three major divisions of the earth, Europe, the Western Hemisphere and the Orient.
