After Many Years

REDDING, Cal., Mar. 21 - John Blaylock, of Sawyer's Bar and Fred Blaylock, of Oak Bar were recently united after a separation of 30 years, during the greater part of which the two brothers had thought each other dead. For the past 6 years they had been mining along the Klamath river, only 75 miles apart, yet they knew nothing of each other's whereabouts until a "local item" in a newspaper, stating that Fred Blaylock's water wheel had been swept away by the river flood, appeared.

John wondered whether the Fred Blaylock mentioned might be his brother. He addressed a letter to him and a happy reunion followed.

The brothers formerly lived in Huron, Michigan. At an early age Fred went to Canada. From there he wrote in 1894 that he was going to Alaska to hunt gold. He was never heard from afterward. It was assumed he was dead.

when I noticed that the wind had changed, that it was hitting me on the right side instead of the left. Then I thought of that 4000-foot drop, the break over-

er without warning, that lay somewhere ahead. For the instant reasoner left me, I fancied I could see trees on all sides, great tall gray shadows in the fog. I was lost! What a hopeless and helpless feeling. I started to cry out, and with that reason returned. Whom was there to hear me? The thought of the change of the wind came next. Blowing as it was, it was likely to change in an instant and then I laughed at my tenderfoot ways. I turned until the wind hit me on the left side and headed for the timber on the left side of the road. There was still a chance that I had reached a point near the Lodge and would miss the timber, so every few steps I would lie down and look back of me and to the left. At last a tree jumped out of a whirl of snow in front of me - it was about six feet away. I had come within fifty feet of missing all of the trees.

I tried to see the Lodge, there wasn't a speck of shadow anywhere. I then went to the last tree and tried again, but failed to get a glimpse of anything to guide me. Again I had to depend on the wind. I kept the ski pole in front of me, feeling the snow for a break in it. At last I came to a place where the pole would not reach the snow in front of the skis. I had come to some kind of a jumping-off place. Was it the rim, or the drift in front of the Lodge? I backed away and lay down on the snow and waited for a strong blast of wind, and there in front of me, the fog and snow was darkened, it was the Lodge and home.

When I got inside, I found my clothes a mass of ice. I couldn't take off my pack-sack until I had made a fire and thawed it out.

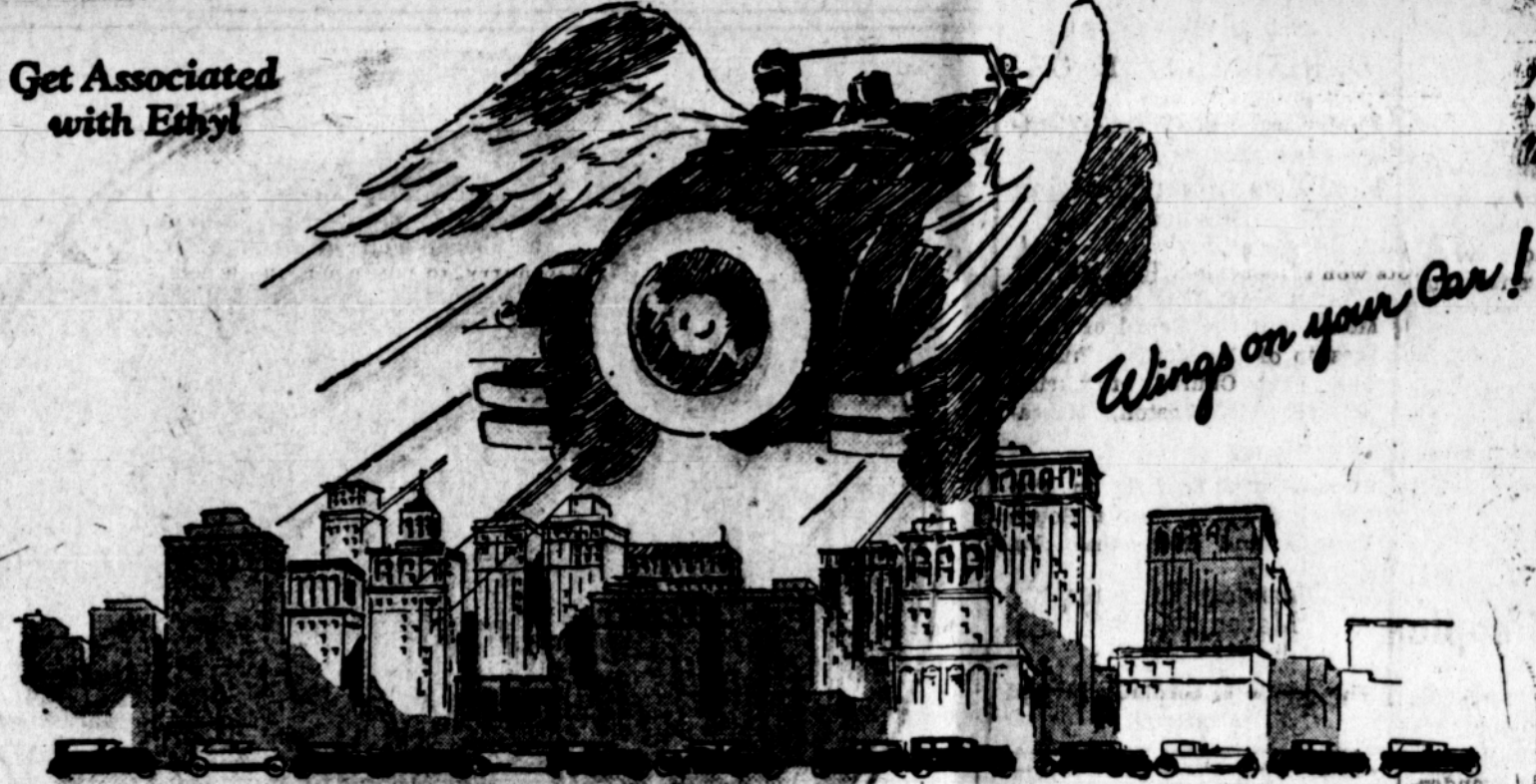
