### GROUND GLASS USED IN AN ATTEMPT TO KILL TWO HORSES

#### Two Fine Percheron Horses Seriously Injured by Unknown Man

OREGON CITY, Mar. 24.—(UN)—Residents of the Gladstone vicinity are incensed over an attempt of an unidentified man to kill two horses belonging to Robert Strickland, with ground glass. Sunday evening as Strickland was returning home he saw a man leaving his barn. He investigated but found nothing missing and the animals apparently unharmed. Monday two Percheron horses, highly prized, were discovered to be bleeding at the mouth and a large amount of ground and broken glass was found to have been mixed with the oats of the horses' feed. The animals were still living today, but were in bad condition. More than a half bucket of glass was found in the bin with the feed.

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**TO BROADCAST PARADE**

SEATTLE, Wash., Mar. 24.—(UN)—Banned from parading through the crowded thoroughfares of large cities, the Hagenback-Wallace circus has met the situation with the aid of science. Dan Odum, general manager of the circus, has filed application for a permit for a 100-watt radio broadcasting station of a 275-meter wave length.

Hereafter, Odum said, roars of the wild animals, the circus band and vocal artists will be heard on the air, thus advertising the show at the parade used to do before traffic put it out of business.
