ARKANSAS FLOOD IS DOING MUCH DAMAGE

Reports From Stricken Area Indicate Flood Getting Worse

LITTLE ROCK, Ar., Mar. 25.—(UN)—Fear that the flood in eastern Arkansas will be worse than any since 1912 was expressed today by Adjutant General J. R. Wayne following reports from the stricken areas.

The national guards are becoming pressed for tents and other equipment to send the victims. The troops today began patching old tents and believe that they will be able to supply two or three hundred more.

Hundreds of residents in the lowlands of the Mississippi, White, St. Francis and Laugille river bottoms are being driven from their homes by rising waters.

The Missouri Pacific Railroad company, which operates lines through the flooded districts, is making no charge for transporting tents and equipment to sufferers. The company also is furnishing freight cars for housing purposes.

GREAT TIMBER CUT

VICTORIA, B. C., March 25.—(UN)—The 1926 timber cut in British Columbia was greater than in any previous year. A report tabled in the legislature by T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands shows that 2,900,000,000 feet of lumber were cut last year.

TIMBERMAN KILLED BEND, Mar. 24.—(UN)—Joe Franich, 42 year old choker setter, was instantly killed, this morning, when hit in the side by a piece of timber. The accident happened at the logging camp of a local lumber company 30 miles south of Bend.

The log broke as men started to move it. A piece flew through the air, striking Franich and killing him instantly.

POWER OF MUSIC WILL BE TRIED OUT FRIDAY

Dreamy Eyed Young Pianist Has a New Theory to Try

NEW YORK, Mar. 25.—Music's power to soothe civilized aches and pains gets its first try-out in a big way Friday night. Houston Ray, a wavy-haired, dreamy-eyed young concert pianist, has promised to sit down and insert vim, vigor and vitality into an audience at Carnegie hall with a grand piano and high powered

electrical equipment. Sound wave therapy, he calls it. He himself is styled "the music healer."

"Of course, I'm utterly confident the experiment will be a success," he told the United News. "You will see strange things Friday night. This is the first great public demonstration with complete equipment, but we know what we are going to do."

The audience is to get a dose not only of amplified Brahms, Beethoven and Bach but they are to be sprayed with penetrating light waves. "Sound waves, therapy" machines are designed "to allow one to hear music at a normal sound propensity and at the same time feel the same music waves with great force," Ray explained.

Ray and a co-worker, Dr. Ward Gibson, an inventor of radio devices, have been in New York preparing for the demonstration since early winter.
