Poet's Hands Are Hailed a Miracle
BERLIN, (UP) — A startling adventure, experienced by the famed Indian poet; Rabindranath Tagore, during his recent visit to Bucharest, is going the rounds in the Rumanian press.
It was after Tagore had been received by King Ferdinand, by the social, artistic and literary luminaries of the Rumanian capital, that he himself appeared as host in the luxurious parlor of Bucharest's first hotel, the Anthem Palace. Ladies of the Rumanian aristocracy had hastily cancelled their bridge and roulette parties, purchased lavish bouquets for the oriental poet and employed every ruse of clothing and cosmetics in order to impress their charms upon the distinguished Indian visitor.
The parlor of the hotel was crowded with the flower of Rumanian aristocracy and beauty long before the poet himself arrived on the scene. As he stepped into the room he was showered with blossoms, impassioned requests for his autograph and extravagant Balkan compliments.
In their adulation of the Indian poet, many women approached him, curtsied and kissed his hand. Undaunted by this zealous

tribute, Tagore began to address his guests. And even while the lips of Bucharest's fairest women were being pressed against his hands, he spoke to them of brotherliness, love, goodness and eternal peace.
Just as the last lady stooped to kiss his hand, Tagore, in his modulated rhythmic voice, declared, "And therefore, my brothers and sisters, the blood of our fellow mortals should never stain our hands!"
A cry of horror suddenly pierced the silence of this mystic scene and a woman's voice was heard: "He's wounded! The poet's hands are bleeding!"
A score of sisterly handkerchiefs were thrust forward to bind the poet's wounds, to offer him

the services of adoring Samaritans.
"A miracle," someone murmured, "The blood on his hands is a sign from heaven."
But the dramatic scene lasted but a moment. Peering over his long, white beard, Tagore gazed at his hands, for a second studying the red blotches. Then he smiled playfully, understandingly.

He had immediately grasped the fact that his hands were stained with the red relics of kisses from over-rouged lips.
After a tense hush, he resumed his speech on peace and good will.
