STRANGE TALE OF HERO-ISM IS UNCOVERED

(Continued From Page One)

The cutter hurried to the rescue and removed all persons on board including the captain and crew. That night a storm suddenly lashed the seas into a fury. Bulkheads on the Wellington, weakened by the torpedo explosion gave way and the ship settled by the bow. Frantic SOS calls brought an American destroyer to the second rescue, but before the naval vessel arrived, the Wellington sank.

The destroyer steamed over the scene of the disaster and picked up ten British seamen. Ten of the Seneca volunteers were lost. The last to be sighted by the destroyer were two men aboard a small raft. One was standing stark naked in the bitter wind of late winter with second man gripped between a his knees.
