BEETHOVEN  
On March twenty-sixth, one hundred years ago, occurred the death of Beethoven, a man whose name is identified with the greatest classic epoch in all musical history.

It is particularly appropriate that music lovers throughout the world are giving special thought to the music of this master during the year 1926 and 1927.

No one has surpassed Beethoven in fulfilling all the ideal conditions of instrumental music. In his art he was the soul of earnestness and untiring diligence.

Always conscientious, he did not accept the first suggestions of imagination, but brought his keen judgment to bear again and again upon the themes, altering and re-creating, until the whole composition was perfect in structure and harmony.

Beethoven is the one figure in musical history, of whose compositions the daring statement might justly be made, that not one page exists which is not artistically perfect and above criticism.

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Beethoven's mind lent itself most readily to composition for the orchestra and traces of this orchestral cast are found in all his works. Beethoven's genius reached its height in his symphonies, piano sonatas, string quartets, trios and sonatas for piano with violin and cello. In the vocal field, "The Mount of Olives" is an oratorio of special note.

Love and appreciation of Beethoven's music are increasing as the years pass. Although his genius reached out far beyond his day, Beethoven did not live and die without recognition from contemporaries.

When deafness and illness came to him, friends rallied about him and saved him from want. It is said that twenty thousand people attended his funeral.
