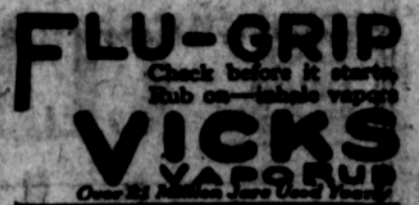
to the reports of American officers who engaged in a skirmish across the river several days ago, when one Mexican was killed.

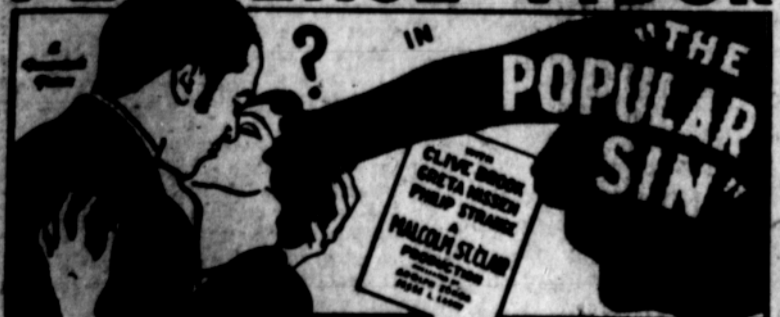
