who are in their "second blooming" and assorted sizes and shapes of men and women, mostly suffering from some unhappiness, usually mental or spiritual, due to sexual causes.

In a lecture delivered recently, Dr. Hirschfeld declared that love is the human right which has most frequently been trodden under foot. He suggested that all ages, men have devised laws of morality, the ludicrousness of which it has usually required a century to discover.

Taking a newspaper, Dr. Hirschfeld pointed to the story of a girl who had drowned herself to escape the contumely of becoming an unmarried mother. Another item narrated the shooting of an impassioned lover by an irate husband.

"Must this be?" asked Dr. Hirschfeld. "Not necessarily. The uprising of women everywhere, shaking old prejudices, is evoking a reconsideration of our moral code. We are in the midst of a mighty crisis. We are witnessing the birth of a new social morality."

CANTONESE LEADERS URGE BOBBED HAIR FOR WOMEN

PEKING, March 28.—(UP)—Reports from Chungking, Hooan, declare a flurry followed rumors of the latest contemplated "war atrocity" general compulsory bobbing of all women.

The revolutionary Cantonese were of the opinion, it was said, that since the republican revolution had resulted in loss of the men's "pig tails," the new Southern revolution should find its emblem in the bobbing of women's hair. On a given date "scissors brigades" were to sally forth and shear all and sundry in the interests of the republican principles of liberty, equality and sacrifice.

But before a counter-revolutionary movement could be instituted by conservative minded women, it became known that the rumor was exaggerated. No compulsion was to be exercised. However, it was hinted that the Nationalist Government thought bobbed hair for women was thoroughly to be commended.

BERLIN, (UP)—Berlin's birth rate has dropped alarmingly and according to the latest official figures, deaths are virtually keeping pace with birth. Among every thousand citizens of Upper Silesia, births exceed deaths by 15.4. But in Berlin the excess of births over deaths for thousand population is only 0.9.

Moreover, the marriage rate in Berlin is the lowest of any German city.
