At the same time it was announced that the U. S. National and the First National had agreed to guarantee the Northwestern accounts. The run started late yesterday and continued until late in the evening. All wishing to withdraw were permitted to do so. Those withdrawing were mostly small depositors. Officials said the circulation of false rumors had caused the run.
