DARING FLIGHT IS PLANNED BY AVIATOR
Member of Arctic Expedition to Rescue a Sick Man
FAIRBANKS, Alaska, Mar. 30.—(UN)—One of the most successful flights in the history of Alaskan aviation is proposed by Joe Crosson, veteran Fairbanks flyer now at Point Barrow with members of Captain George H. Wilkins' Arctic expedition.
 The purpose of the flight is to reach a sick man at Sevoonga on the Bering Sea coast south of Cape St. Lawrence, and to take him to Nome for medical treatment.
 According to word reaching Fairbanks Monday, Crosson was ready to leave Point Barrow on the hazardous journey along the desolate coast line.
 Crosson's plane, a small Swallow, has a cruising radius of 450 miles.

SYMPATHY RESOLUTION VOTED FOR CHAPLIN
VIENNA, (UP)—The League for Men's Rights, an Austrian organization to defend men from feminine oppression, has sent Charlie Chaplin a message of sympathy, urging him to found an American chapter of the anti-women's league.
 In a resolution, the Viennese league declares that "poor Charlie has been ruined by his wife. This case shows how necessary our movement for the rights of men has become. Fortunately there is not yet a law in Europe which permits the perpetration of this California injustice from our fellow men here."

JOHNSON ADMITS HE IS NOT A CANDIDATE
California Senator Through With Presidential Aspirations
WASHINGTON, Mar. 28.—Senator Hiram Johnson of California has publicly admitted that his presidential aspirations are dead. "Do you expect to be a candidate for president next year?" asked a young reporter as Johnson emerged from an important call at the White House.
 "I am," Johnson replied, "the only member of the United States senate who has had the germ and from whom it has been thoroughly eradicated."
 Thus ended the long search which George H. Diogenes, the well known volunteer detective, has been conducting around the United States senate.
 The old cynic has burned a good deal of oil on this assignment.
 He was leaning against a tree near the White house, thinking what a dull day it was, when the honest senate from California came out and made his historical utterance.
 "Eureka," exclaimed the old man when the Irish dawned on him. "Take me back to the dear old farm to die."
 Johnson came back in full display of his old power when he held the senate in all night session in a futile effort to break the filibuster against his Boulder Dam bill. That defeat did not sour him.
 "I think the chances of the bill are better than ever," he said today.
 Two years ago he would not have said that. He would have said something about the old guard conspiring against him.
 Johnson probably is more popular for a time. It has been generally suspected for some time that he had finally come to the conclusion that he would never get to the White House. At least he ceased acting like an unsuccessful candidate with an inferiority complex.
 Johnson is starting back to California Tuesday to prepare for his campaign for re-election to the senate. He has a running start because of his Boulder Dam fight, which has made him intensely popular in California.

ASTORIA Mill is Saved From Fire
ASTORIA, March 29.—(UN)—Flames which were destroying the Newberg Shingle company's mill at Skamokawa, Wash., were discovered and extinguished early this morning by the crew of the Harkins Transportation company's river steamer Lurline, which arrived just as the fire was sweeping the mill.
 Damage was kept down to about \$10,000 by prompt action of the unofficial firemen.
 The fire had not been discovered by the people of Skamokawa when the boat arrived and it was not until the rivermen had the fire practically extinguished that the residents of the town were awakened.
TEA DRINKING INCREASES AS HARD DRINKING DROPS
LONDON, (UP)—Latest statistics compiled by the internal revenue department show that the lowered consumption in whiskey drinking due to the present tax of 18 per cent per gallon, has been met by a corresponding increase in tea drinking.
 Taxation experts are cudgeling their brains for new sources to tax for additional revenue, but it is said it is no likely that they will pick on tea, as it is conceded that any further increase in the tea tax would result in something like the famous "Boston Tea Party" being re-enacted at London docks.
