PLANE IS THOUGHT TO BE IN THE BAY

Extensive Search for Missing Pilot Brings no Results

SAN FRANCISCO, April 5.—(UP)—A score of airplanes and hundreds of men are searching central California for a mail plane which has been missing for more than 2 days.

Aboard the plane when it left Fresno on its regular schedule at 3:20 a. m. Sunday were Edward Nehr, pilot, and Albert Schaller, an official of the Pacific Air Transport, Inc., which operates the Pacific coast division of the air mail service.

The plane was due two hours after its departure from Fresno. It was reported definitely over Chowchilla, and Livingston and there were reports that its motor was heard over San Francisco, but no further trace of the machine has been found.

Those directing the hunt for the lost airmen believed that the plane either plunged into San Francisco bay after motor trouble or that it was forced down in the hilly section of the San Joaquin valley.

PORTLAND, April 5.—(UP)—Bands of rabid infected coyotes have appeared in numbers in Grant county and residents of that section are up in arms over the situation.

The situation took a turn for the worse Monday when it was reported that Chester Craddock of Bear Valley was attacked by his own dog after it had contracted the dreaded disease. The incident occurred on Craddock's farm. He was working in the barn when a coyote, crazed by the disease, entered. He sought safety in the rafters while his dog drove the animal out.

Later Craddock's dog became infected with rabies and Craddock was forced to shoot him.
