files to register their cars and to obtain maps.

We have advertised the opening of the Southern Oregon Normal School in newspapers, magazines and other ways, and have furnished photo cuts for use of the school. We have also assisted in presenting our section of Southern Oregon through movies, etc., at San Francisco, in co-operation with the Lion's Club of Medford.

**Entertainment**

Entertainment has loomed large in our past year's program, not in the sense of furnishing ourselves with programs of jollity, but in the manner of providing hospitality and good cheer to those sojourning for a time in our midst.

A banquet at the opening of the Normal school and a trip to Crater Lake was furnished as our contribution to entertainment of the student body last summer. Many individual courtesies to visitors in our community, a banquet and entertainment to the County Assessors of the State, and numerous other affairs are mentioned in reports of our Entertainment and Forum Committees.

Two delightful affairs of a more distinctly local character were the indoor golf parties sponsored by the Chamber to assist in promoting the Ashland Golf Course.

A very decided effort was made in the direction of a Land Settlement program. A co-operative plan was entered into with the Medford Chamber of Commerce, and the County Court, which brought some results and a better general understanding of the problem.

**Civic Affairs and Street Improvements**

Your Civic Affairs and Street Improvement Committee, with Major Malone as Chairman, has functioned as you are aware with outstanding achievement.

**Education and Schools**

Your committee on education and schools has been an advisory committee largely for the purpose of fostering and aiding the progress of the Normal School whenever necessary. At the request of Mr. Churchill and of the Board of Directors your Secretary remained in Salem during the Legislative Session but thru a fortunate arrangement this entailed no expense on our Chamber.

**Endorsement**

One committee which is always available for service is frequently overlooked, the so-called Endorsement Committee, but as a matter of fact the mere having of such a committee is a matter of importance, as it provides opportunity for dispensing with as much of the solicitation from out-

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side and unworthy sources, as the merchants themselves are desirous of doing.

**Tel and Tel**

You will note expenditures for telegram and telephone instances of expense in this direction have occurred relating to various measures pending in Congress and our Senators and Congressmen have been called upon in relation to our local interests in several cases of late.

**Forums**

Your Forum Committee reported forty-one forums held during the year, and mentioned the speakers at each Forum. Attendance ranged from 18 to 95, an average of over 40.

**Auto Camp and Tourists**

Your Auto Camp and Tourists Committee have interested themselves in the cabin equipment at the Auto Park and in the Electric Sign in the Plaza.

Our celebrations and conventions committee, aside from carrying on the usual July 4th celebration, have made such proposals as possible toward obtaining any conventions and believe the W. O. W. Convention will be held here in 1928.

**Band Concerts and Music**

We provided and arranged for no less than twelve band concerts during the summer including those by the D. O. K. K. Band of Medford on July 4th, the Infantry Band of Medford on July 4th, the Infantry Band of Portland during the encampment, and our own local band, throughout the season.

**Convention Delegates**

We sent delegates to the State Chamber of Commerce Annual meeting, and contributed to the support of this organization.

We succumbed to the inevitable once more and provided another July 4th Celebration. Our Committee has told you of the program with the co-operation of other organizations.

**Summer School**

We assisted the Summer Art School as usual and gladly note a growing interest in this which brings a considerable group of noteworthy people to our city each season.

**Sports**

We held a fine Tennis Tournament last summer and gave a splendid silver cup to the winner. This can be made an outstanding event of Southern Oregon.

We contributed largely to the

erection of a grandstand for the athletic field which we believe will be well justified.

**Contingent**

Under this item of expense we assisted a young man who met with an accident to his car on the Crater Lake picnic, which seemed a fair thing to do.

**Industrial Development**

We have some natural resources that ought to be more fully developed. You all know what they are. We have an excellent committee, men who are themselves individually working along this line.

We have some established industries that have been receiving our support and backing. Let's talk about our cannery, and its high grade products. Let the world know that Ashland canned pears and tomatoes are the best, and so with our Creamery and Box Factory and Iron foundry and Granite Works, etc.

**Membership**

We hesitate to speak on this item but it is a necessary duty. It is seven years since our re-organization, and during that period we have made no real membership drive. We have helped organize other clubs, have assisted in money raising campaigns for community enterprises, have postponed and deferred our own planned campaign until we have given the impression we can run a forever without any such effort as all other similar organizations frequently undertake.

As a matter of fact our membership has reached a point where we must make a concerted effort to revive and restore it to the three hundred mark. We have drifted along quite comfortably but have failed to impress on the general public the fact that the continuance of our organization and its work is contingent upon individual memberships. It is not fair to ask our business men to contribute almost the whole of the amount required to support the Chamber because many of its activities are for the entire community. A brief energetic campaign by an interested committee should place our membership in proper condition.

**Roads and Highways**

The time has come when we want a better road to Lake of the Woods and must demand it of our County Court. We get nothing by

waiting for it to come. Let's go after it.
