of the skis and I soon found out that it was going to be the full 23 miles to Fort Klamath. I picked up two flag poles that I had used to mark short cut for the ski race and left my pike ski poles beside the trail. It was easier going with two poles. If I ever bring a tandem-roof in here again I surely will make him use two poles.
 Near Anna Springs the snow turned to rain and it didn't help the sliding, but I managed to keep up a three mile gate. Below Anna Springs the snow began to stick to the skis and I slowed down. On the Gold Spring hill I broke a pole trying to make time and took a spill, and had to cut another pole.
 When I reached the long straight stretch of road below the mill and looked down it for a mile and a half, not a sign of a track of any kind. I know you will forgive me, even though you are a Christian, when I tell you that I said damn, and I used a capital D. I was as wet as though I had been in a Baptist sermon. I wonder how I would have felt if I had known that central was going to forget to call anyone to come and meet me, as she did. I am sure that I would have said something worse than I did when I saw the mile and a half of unbroken road.
 The rain came down harder, the snow became like glue, the skis seemed to surface with sand paper, but at last I came to the place where the road had been broken. Then began the interesting past time of watching for the car that was coming to meet me. I expected to see it at every turn in the road. At times I stopped and listened for the hum of a motor. Not a sound but the crack of the half frozen rain as it hit the snow. I had traveled about a mile when I heard a snort behind me, there came bounding down the road the sweetest tin can that I ever saw. It was bouncing like a new born grasshopper. It seemed to prefer to travel in the snow bank, that was over it's hood rather than in the ruts of the road. The fenders were bent, the radiator set at a rakish angle, one side of the hood was flapping with each bound, the top, well it had three good bows. Between each bound the herder sounded the horn for me to get ready to get in. I got off my skis and picked them up just as the car was along side of me. I don't know what I did to frighten it but it gave a snort and landed in a snow bank and I had to dig it out with my skis.
 I thought that it would be rough riding when I saw it coming down the road, but that was only a whisper to what it seemed when we started down the two crooked ruts. I have been on the hurricane deck of wild bronk, in an open boat in a rough sea, I have ridden with R. W. Price as driver, but that battered tin can had them all beat to a frazzle. And that driver was an ex-bronk busster, he clamped his teeth down on a crooked pipe stem and smiled a crooked smile, every moment I expected to see him climb out on the hood and begin to whip the radiator with his hat. Well, we made the Ft. in one flat, (tire.) I got my skis out of the back and staggered into the hotel. I don't know yet whether I would rather ski on wet snow or ride that animal over that road.
 I laid over two days in Fort Klamath for pictures. No I guess it was three days. In that time I had gathered up quite a load of things to bring back with me. I had fifteen hundred feet of films, mail, tools. I think the pack weighed about 50 pounds when I was ready to start, and I know it weighed a hundred before I reached Anna Springs.
 I began to feel the weight of my pack before I reached the entrance, and I knew that I would have to rest my same leg often or
