Adalyn Wright McCauley, national poppy chairman, writes the following: "The little red poppy which sprang from the soil of sentiment after the World war, as the Memorial Flower of the American Legion and the Auxiliary has had many struggles to keep its place in our hearts as a Memorial Emblem, because of the inroads of commercialism so prevalent in this present age. In many communities the poppy was recognized only as a red tag to be sold on the streets to make money."

"It has been my endeavor as national poppy chairman for three years to establish the poppy in its right place in the hearts of Legionnaires and Auxiliary women, and through education have the public in general learn to know and love our poppy—not as a red tag to be bought and worn indifferently, but as an emblem of sacrifice to be worn with reverent understanding."
