ANCIENT BATTLE LURE FOUND IN SUES CANAL

CAIRO, (UP)—After being at the bottom of the Suez Canal for 45 years, a block of red granite, inscribed with the Lyban campaign of the Pharaoh Menepthah, has been transferred to the Cairo Museum.

The block was discovered near Benha in 1882, but while being conveyed to Cairo on board a barge it broke through the bottom and sank. It weighs eight tons. It was recently recovered from the canal and conveyed to Cairo by rail and was dragged to the Museum on a sledge by laborers.

Inscriptions on the monument describe the devastation of the enemy country, enumerating the categories of 10,000 persons who were slain and mutilated and tells of the number of women and children who were carried off.

Menepthah was the Pharaoh whose record of a campaign in Palestine contains the earliest known reference to the children of Israel.
