Winston Churchill, Chancellor of the Exchequer, was recently asked in the House of Commons if he expected to introduce legislation to tax unmarried men over

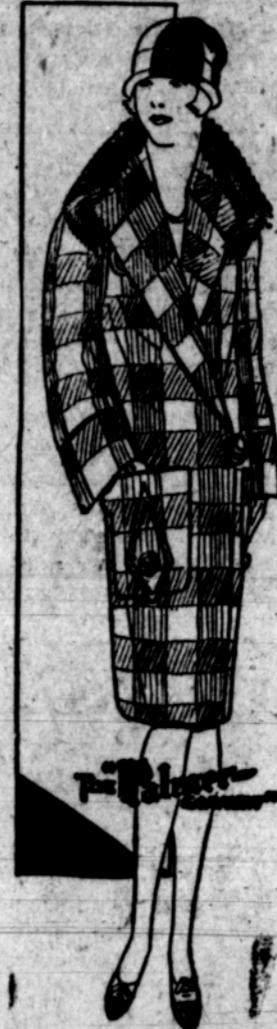
25. Churchill succeeded in evading the question, but was immediately confronted with a question of whether he realized the present income tax differentiates to a large degree against bachelors.
