### W.O.W. MAKING PLANS FOR NEW MEMBERS

Will Attempt to Increase Membership for National Convention

F. B. Tichenor, deputy head of consul of Portland T. T. Chave, district manager at Eugene, G. C. Tichenor, district manager at Salem and Jack Spong, the youngest magician on the American stage, are in Ashland in the interest of the Woodmen of the World, of which they are representatives from the head office in Portland.

It is their wish that the next national convention of the Woodmen of the World be held in Ashland, for approximately ten days starting June 28, 1927. The local lodge of 100 members must be increased to 200 before the convention can be held in this city and these four men will endeavor, by talking with and meeting the local business men, Kiwanians, Lithians, members of the Chamber of Commerce and the citizens of Ashland, to interest them in this celebration and accomplish their work within the next two weeks.

Headquarters will be established here immediately and the representatives will open the charter so that one will be able to join for the low price of \$3.00. On the night of initiation, providing the additional members can be secured, Congressman W. C. Hawley, Mayor Geo. L. Baker of Portland and Governor L. L. Patterson, all members of the Woodmen of the World, will be in Ashland.

The dance is executed once every 33 years and forms the high light of the tribal conference here this year.

The weird ceremony, conducted under the guiding hand of the "great spirit" is executed to the cadence of throbbing tom-toms and chanting by the assembled redskins.

It follows an all day fiesta.
