INDIANS PUT ON A SENSATIONAL DANCE

Flames on the Ceremonial Pyre Are Stamped Out by Braves

RIVERSIDE, Cal., April 16.—(LP)—Time was turned back to the heyday of the first Americans and modern civilization was obscured in the smoke of burning willow fagots as 35 lithe Indians, dancing to the rhythmic throbbing of the tom toms stamped out the flames of the ceremonial pyre here last night.

The weird spectacle, furnished but three times in a century and known to the red man as "koot-yoo-tookish", and to the paleface as "kill fire" dance, was witnessed by about 800 blanket members of the Mojaves, Yumas, Cocopahs, Utes, Plutes, Navajos, Apaches and Hopis.

It was the climaxing ceremonial to the long series of ancient rites that ended the annual convention of the mission Indian federation.

To the monotonous throbbing of the tom tom the flower of the Indian nations re-pledged faith in "the great spirit" by testing flesh against fire.

chance to discover themselves and what their future work may have less guess or trial and error than if this experimental period had not been offered throughout the Junior high school course. It is the plan of the school officials now to make this vocational work for the boys elective through some of the years. One term will be devoted largely to the literature of the vocations. In this class the boys will learn the requirements, the advantages and the disadvantages of the different professions and trades. It is believed that such a knowledge will help them to find themselves and to choose the thing they are hoping to do more wisely than they have done heretofore.

MISSISSIPPI FLOOD ESTABLISHES RECORD

Additional Rains Expected That Will Create Dangerous Situation

WASHINGTON, April 15.—(LP)—Floods in the Mississippi valley between Cairo, Ill., and

the mouth of the Mississippi river will be the greatest on record with an average excess above previous floods of one foot weather bureau announced today.

Additional rains during the past two days over Missouri, Arkansas, Mississippi, the western portions of Kentucky and Tennessee and northern and western Louisiana can only intensify existing flood conditions, the weather bureau said.

Waters will rise at practically every point along the lower Mississippi valley

The bureau again urged that every possible precautionary measure be taken, because additional rains within the next few days are not improbable and flood crests are near the record breaking point now.
