

DEBATERS ENTERTAIN AT FORUM LUNCHEON

Dena and Dick Joy Discuss Negative Side of Tax Question

The Chamber of Commerce Forum luncheon was well attended yesterday noon and showed much interest not only in the subject under discussion, but in the opportunity to encourage the Ashland High school debaters.

Miss Dena Joy and Dick Joy were the speakers and as they are to debate the representatives of the Eugene school on Friday night of this week on the question "Resolved that Oregon should adopt a Severance tax," they confined their discussion to the negative side and argued against such a plan. Members of the Chamber questioned the speakers at the conclusion of their remarks and Messrs E. V. Carter, I. E. Vining, J. C. Hopper and others contributed to the discussion.

Mr. Jack Spong of Salem, contributed to the program with interesting magician performances. Secretary Fuller announced that a very interesting series of speakers had been secured for the next four weeks, among them being Gov. Patterson, C. C. Chapman of the Oregon Voter, H. S. Sneyd, Y. M. C. A. secretary of Yokohama, Japan, and others. Next Tuesday the program will be in charge of the Jackson county health unit and will be of great interest to many. Comedy Star is Killed in Fight

LOS ANGELES, April 20.—Dorothy Mackaye, the actress wife of Ray Raymond, collapsed in hysterics in the county court house at noon as the grand jury prepared to open and probe into the alleged bare-knuckle murder of her husband. With a terrified scream the young actress fainted as she was being led along the corridor.

The district attorney's office rushed the case to the grand jury and announced that a murder indictment be asked for Paul Kelly, film juvenile and the ascertained sweetheart of Mrs. Raymond.

LOS ANGELES, April 20.—(LP)—The eternal triangle was precipitated into the tragic death of Ray Raymond, nationally known musical comedy star, when Paul Kelly, moving picture actor held on suspicion of murder in connection with the death, admitted according to police that he was in love with Dorothy Mackaye, actress wife of the dead man.

Raymond died in a hospital here Tuesday morning under mysterious circumstances and after he had been severely beaten in a fist fight with Kelly Saturday afternoon. He failed to regain consciousness from the time he was removed to the hospital.

MANIAC KILLS TWO ON WILD RAMPAGE

Seventy Two Year Old Man Barricades Self and Resists Arrest

PETALUMA, Cal., April 20.—Claiming two victims after a mad rampant gunfire, Joe Falla, 72 year old crazed reclus, was slain here today. Preceding the bullet which pierced Falla's heart, fired by an officer crouched behind a tree through a window, the crazed man earlier killed a citizen on a downtown street and an officer of the posse which was trying to arrest him.

H. L. Rasmussen, deputy sheriff, was the second victim, being shot through the head as he advanced on the residence.

PETALUMA, Cal., April 20.—With one victim shot dead as the result of a maniacal rampage, John Falla, aged 72, barricaded himself in his home here today and resisted all efforts of the police to dislodge him. He locked himself in his residence after dashing down the street shooting at random. Mike Pheas, a restaurant cook, was killed when he attempted to wrest the rifle from Falla's hands. He was first shot through the stomach and after he fell two more bullets were fired into his head.

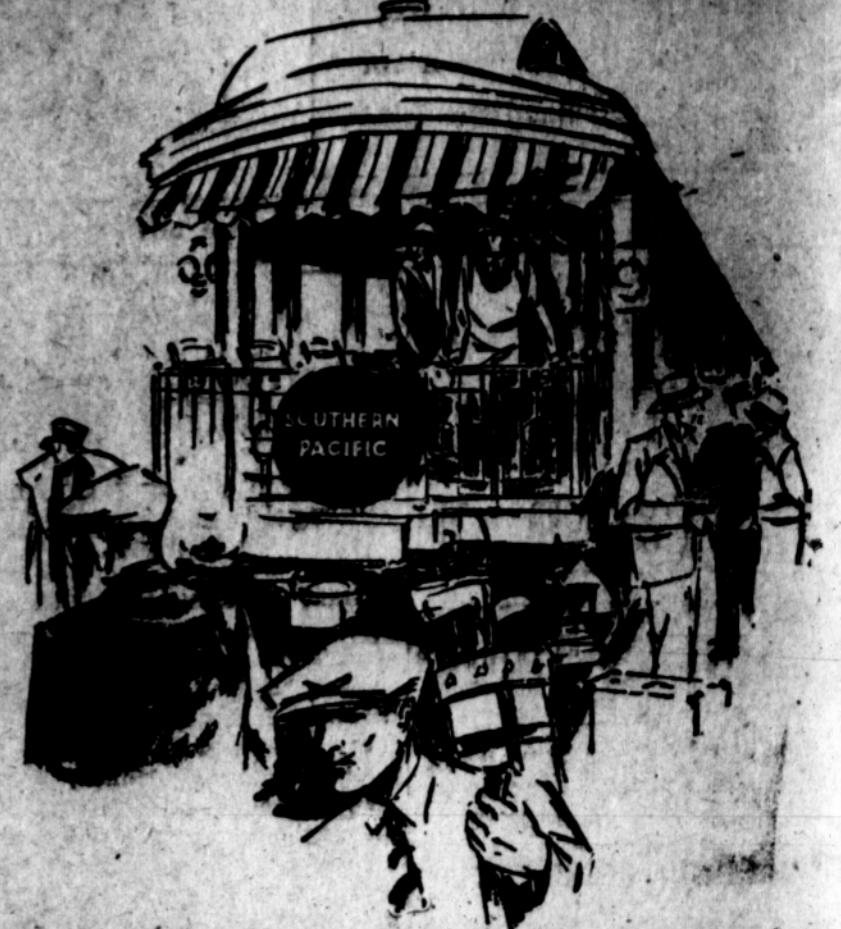

EXTENSIVE SEARCH MADE FOR ROBBERS

Forty Thousand Dollars is Secured from Colorado Bank

LITTLETON, Colo., April 20.—(LP)—Search was extended through north central Colorado for three bandits who robbed the First National Bank of Littleton of \$40,000 in cash and insured bonds.

Denver police reported a large blue sedan, similar to that in which the bandits escaped, had been seen speeding through a residential district in that city. One of its occupants threw bits of broken glass into the street. Officials here expressed belief it was the bandit car and that the broken glass was from the rear window the bandits smashed to provide a loophole for firing at pursuers.
