 SPRINGFIELD, Ill., April 20.—Central Illinois today had contributed at least twenty-three lives and hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of property to the elements which has been terrorizing rural districts of the middle west. Cyclonic winds swept a path across the outskirts of St. Louis, and Springfield late yesterday striking a dozen places and destroying hundreds of homes. The reports show in addition to the dead there are hundreds that are injured. The restoration of wire facilities is expected to disclose more casualties.
