Washington, D. C., April 22.—The Oregon Daughters of the American Revolution delegation attending the convention here was entertained at luncheon today by Mrs. William P. MacCracken of Chicago, wife of the assistant secretary of commerce for aeronautics. Assistant Secretary MacCracken is a nephew of Mrs. Gordon MacCracken of Ashland, Oregon, present regent of the Oregon Daughters of the American Revolution.

Erna Meeker, Oregon pioneer was presented to the convention at its meeting today and spoke briefly on the purposes of the Oregon Folk at Luncheon.

Starting the Saturday afternoon sessions, Rev. Parker of North Bend led the devotion in place of Rev. Allen. Then came an interesting hour, that of the Chapter reports. Joseph Knott's sermon is one that will be long remembered by those in attendance Sunday night, especially the League. Speaking of the phrase "of whom the world was not worthy," he says that "the Crucifixion was not the complete price paid for Christianity, but also the living of blood shed since then by not hundreds, or thousands, but of millions of Christian martyrs." He also states that China will not be made Christian without the dying of Christians. Rev. Knott goes on to say that we as Christians "lack loyalty, appreciation and obligation to Christianity." Oyster Case to Be Closed Today

LOS ANGELES, April 22. — (UP) — The case of the United States of America against "1,000 cases of oysters," probably was closed today.

Federal Judge James signed an interlocutory decree pro confesso admitting the defendant oysters to bond of \$5,000 in behalf of the U. S. Foster Packing company, claimant and inventor.

The oysters were seized by the United States marshal, and confined, it was said, of being adulterated and misleading. Upon posting of the bond to insure them against sale and marketing, the packing company regains possession of the oysters.
