POSSSESSIONS OF CSARS TO GO AT AUCTION

MOSCOW. (AP)—Personal and intimate possessions of the former Russian Csars and their families will be put up at auction in Moscow in the course of the summer. The articles were seized in the royal palaces in and around Leningrad, then called Petrograd, and are not sufficiently prized to be placed in museums. However, the articles are very interesting and many are valuable.

The highest price is expected to be paid for a large fur overcoat

once owned by Czar Alexander III, the father of the last Czar Nicholas II whom the Bolsheviks executed. The coat is lined with perfect pelt of rare silver sables and there is a great cape attached of the same previous fur. The articles to be auctioned were mostly found in the Winter Palace at Leningrad at Tzarskoie Selo, at Peterhof and at Gartchina all sites of favorite palaces. Beds in which kings and princesses slept, lamps, handsome tables and chairs, some magnificent carpets and rugs and some paintings are included in the auction sale.

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Practically every modern convenience to make tourists comfortable is provided and the cabins offer all conveniences of a modern, well-equipped apartment. Each cabin has a gas plate, as well as other cooking facilities. The kitchenette provides gas to those who do not rent a cabin.

Shower baths, two laundries, and other comforts make the weary traveler joyful after a long drive. Adjacent to the Auto Camp is a grocery store, a garage and service station to care for the needs of the travellers.

The Community House has a reading room where magazines, daily papers, mileage charts, Oregon pamphlets on scenic beauties of the state, and detailed road maps of the entire Pacific Coast are available to those who register. For three years Mr. Barber has capably taken care of the tourists, and has many funny stories to tell of the types of conveniences in which the tourists arrive and depart. Many are "hand" made automobiles, with parts of well known cars attached in some peculiar manner. Other cars are without names and there is little possibility of recognizing the various assembled parts. Fords, take precedence over all others, and it is believed that many are of the "1900 type."

The register book in the Community House contains many compliments upon the treatment received, and also many jocular remarks about the life of the tourist. Here is one about the experiences of a camper who will

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"GOOD WILL" CAR IS MOST COMPLETE

The chapel car "Good Will" owned by the American Baptist Publication Society with headquarters at Philadelphia is here in charge of Rev. Chappel and wife, missionaries, and will remain at the siding on Water St. for about three weeks.

These cars of which there are now seven in number in the United States, are literally churches on wheels, containing everything that any church has in addition to living quarters for the minister and family. Entering at the front end of the car is a reception room with book cases and other suitable articles of furniture for the small space allotted. The main meeting room is next and consists of the usual seats with racks in the seats in front for song books. It has an organ of suitable size for this place of worship with a pulpit and baptistry. The room is well lighted by electricity and heated by a small furnace in cold weather or an electric heater when the weather is not cold.

The rear end of the car is for the private use of the missionary and his family and contains a model kitchen, refrigerator, bath and sleeping quarters, consisting of a regulation Pullman car section with upper and lower berth. Cooking, sweeping and in fact practically everything in the line of household duties are done by electricity.

These cars were built 28 years ago at the cost of \$22,000. Six of them now operate west of Denver and the other in the East. The cost of operation of a car being about \$1500 per year and \$4000 per year for missionary salaries and expenses. The cost of transportation is the price of ten full fares.

The "Mother's Day" service will be held at the Baptist church next Sunday at 11 a. m. when Rev. Chappelle will preach. Services will be held at the chapel car at 2:30 and 8 p. m.
