LIVES THREATENED BY RISING FLOOD

Additional Levee Breaks Cause Great Concern in Flood Area

BATON ROUGE, La., May 2.—(AP)—Fourteen thousand Louisianans, in the low districts south of the Red River, are in danger of their lives as a result of the weaknesses developing in the Bayou de Glaises levee at Bourbonville.

Crumbling before the swelling bosom of the Mississippi the low spots at Bourbonville are disintegrating before the surge of rising waters.

A boat was dispatched to Natchez for sandbags to cut off, if possible, the fingers of trickling muddy water before they snatch the bulwark away.

The little cabin of the government river boat "Inspector" was the scene of a dramatic report by Captain Thomas B. Good, commanding the fleet of rescue boats operating in the Red and Black rivers area and into the rapidly filling lower Concordia areas.

Secretary of Commerce Herbert Hoover and Secretary of War Dwight Davis, fatigued with care and lack of sleep, heard the river captain, his eyes tired and his face drawn from the desperate labors of life and death in the lower Mississippi basin, tell of the losing battle in his sector.

KLAMATH WINS FIRST HOME GAME

Grants Pass Defeats Medford by a Score of Eight to Four

Klamath Falls defeated the Boas 19 to 26 in a hotly-contested game played at the Ashland grounds Sunday afternoon.

Several hundred enthusiastic fans lost interest in the contest after the first inning when Klamath scored seven of their 19 runs and left the home team trailing throughout the entire game.

The hard-hitting visitors were stopped in the second inning when Sam Iverson, 19 year old Portland youth who is scheduled to pitch this season for the Boas, replaced Emory Davis.

PUBLIC DEMONSTRATION

Owing to the great interest shown by the livestock and other agricultural interests of the valley in Poa Bulbosa or winter blue grass, a public demonstration will be held at the farm of C. C. Hoover, two miles west of Jacksonville on Ross Lane, Tuesday afternoon, May 10th, at 2 p. m.

Mr. Hoover has a pasture which consists largely of this grass on which his large dairy herd has run all winter, and also a twenty acre tract which is just ready to harvest for seed. Professor Reimer, of the Southern Oregon Experiment Station, who has made a careful study of this grass will be present and will talk on this subject. Mr. Hoover will tell of his experience with this new grass both for pasture and for seed. This is an opportunity to get this information first hand and anyone interested is invited to attend.

SPELLING SURVEY MADE IN ASHLAND

Survey is Made in Public Schools Here in Connection With Survey

A spelling survey was conducted Thursday in the Ashland public school for the purpose of judging the efficiency of teaching in the state and to test whether the words used are those which occur in the writing vocabulary of the average person.

This survey was part of the investigation being carried on over the entire state by a committee appointed by the Oregon State Teachers Association. The committee prepared a list of 100 words for the third to eighth grades inclusive selected from the state spelling text and the Horn list of the 10,000 words used in the written work of average people.

Teachers were given the test as a group using a broad general vocabulary. Unselected groups such as Kiwanis clubs were also tested.

The results of the state-wide survey will be tabulated by the committee and published in the Oregon Teachers' Journal.

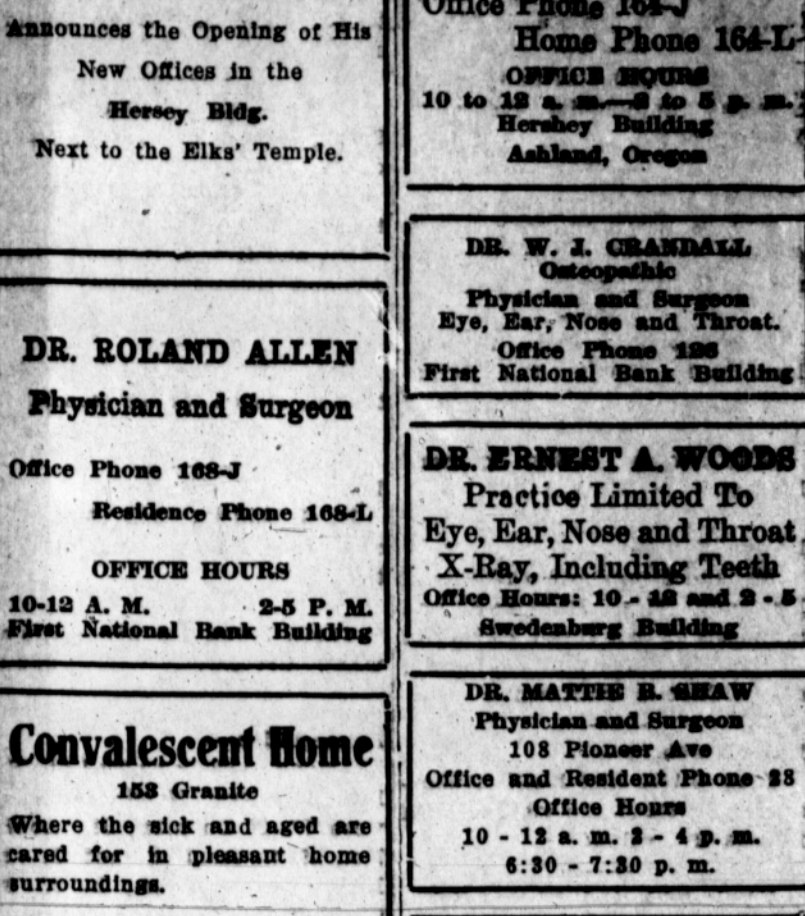
