NEW COACH NAMED FOR NORMAL SCHOOL

R. W. McNeal, Successful Albany College Coach, is Employed

R. W. McNeal has been selected as director of athletics for the southern Oregon Normal school, according to an announcement made Saturday by President J. A. Churchhill. Mr. McNeal has been coaching at College of Puget Sound, Tacoma, Wash. His position here will be director of physical education, athletics and part-time assistant instructor in Biology.

Coach McNeal was graduated from the University of Wisconsin in 1917 with a degree in agricultural chemistry. From September of 1917 to June 1926, he was a member of the faculties of two northwestern colleges.

From September of 1917 to June 1922, he had charge of the athletic program at Albany College and was also head of the chemistry department. During the years 1922 to 1926 he has been coach and athletic director at College of Puget Sound.

During his experience in athletics he has coached football, basketball, baseball and track. While coaching at Albany his team played 102 games, 77 of which they won, or a little over 75 per cent of games participated in during the athletic season.

His athletic record at Puget Sound far exceeds his record at Albany. The success of his teams there is enviable for the 45 games his basketball team participated in but eleven were lost. The Puget Sound football team won 18 games, lost 11, and tied three. The baseball team played a total of

25 games losing but two.

Coach McNeal's baseball teams have all made superior records. He is termed a "crackerjack" as a baseball coach, and is widely recognized as an excellent basketball coach. He is also very competent in track and football. Coach McNeal is 35 years of age. He and his family will move to Ashland in September, when he will take up his duties here. This summer he plans to take special work in Biology at some university in southern California.
