The Lithia Water

The Board of Directors of the Chamber of Commerce at a recent meeting passed resolutions pledging themselves to see that every thing possible was done to develop the Lithia water program in Ashland. This is a step that Ashland has long been waiting for, and one that is certain to bring results. A city with the natural assets of Ashland would seem to be doubly blessed. There would be occasion for promotion work, legitimate, not the cheap ballyhooing of a stock salesman and blue sky artists, but real sincere boosting, that would only stop when those people with the necessary vision and capitol had been attracted to Ashland.

A sanitarium here, with the life giving Lithia water available would attract hundreds of people to Ashland. The Tidings editor has a letter from a newspaper man in Battle Creek, Michigan, written in response to our request, that is as amazing as the original tale of Alladins Lamp. Their problem is similar to ours, they had the water and didn't know wha tto do with it. Finally a small association of men banded themselves together, with but one idea and that to develop their mineral waters. A small sanitarium was built, it was crude and far from modern, but it was a start. The fame of this little sanitarium spread, and from the small start that was made years ago, the city of Battle Creek, a hustling, bustling city known all over the world, has developed.

It is beyond the vision of any man to fortell what Ashland can do along this line. Certainly what has been done before can be done again. Certainly Ashland has every opportunity to develop. It depends upon the people that live here what the city shall become. If they want it to go ahead, it will. If they decide that there shall be no united effort to develop that which is our natural heritage, then things will stop just where they are. New Regulations Would Prohibit Marriage Until Age of Thirty ROME, -(LP)-No Italian air-

man, whether he be officer, pilot or mechanic, may before the age of 30. This regulation, though based

on serious and practical considerations, has caused a ripple among the young aviators, who find themselves bound by the same rules as the priesthood. They are in fact, until they reach the age of 30, turned into a kind of priestly caste.

The new law imposing this ob-ligatory, celibacy is based on the presumption that a man cannot, if he ha sa wife and family, give of his best in a service, which, bove all things, requires daring and single-middedness. The report introducing the new measure states that "the obligations and duties deriving from the possess sion of a family exercise a notable influence on the serenity of spirit of persons attached to the air

There is the same principle behind the new law as that which enjoins obligatory celibacy on the Catholic priesthood, whereby, acording to the belief of the church, man cannot at the same time serve his sacred mission and his family. .

The Italian aviation authoriies believe that pilots must be young men and allowed them to marry after the age of 30, on the supposition, that in the majority of cases, by that time, they will go into the ground service.

The new regulation only applies to military and naval airmen; avlators in the commercial services being free to marry when they
