KNEE BREECHES FOR WOMEN ARE DECREED

Antidote for Ever Shortening Skirts Suggested By London Leader

PARIS.—(LP)—Woman is turning to knee breeches as an antidote for the ever shortening short skirts, according to the most advanced Paris couturiers.

Recently Paris male sports started a campaign to secure approval for the knee-breeches for men, as a declaration of independence that man had just as much the right to show his legs as the weaker sex. But the male style for knee-breeches is still in the realm of dreams, and woman as usual has beaten man at his own game.

Various conscientious Paris dressmakers have tried to lengthen the skirts of their models, but to no avail; their clients have demanded them shorter. Now a well-known Spanish author has announced that the main reason why there are no longer serious plays at the theater is that the short skirt is conducive only to frivolous skits.

In the face of this problem, the dressmakers, admitting that if the skirt goes much higher the wearer can no longer sit down with discretion, have evolved the female pantaloons to go under the short skirt.

There will be short knee-breeches and long ones, pants which puff out and pants that cling to the limbs. Others, principally for evening wear, will be trimmed with lace and precious stones. Paris dressmakers remark that there is a precedent for this new style, the under-trousers of lady's bathing suit years ago before anyone had even dared to think of the one-piece effects of today.

The sea-side fad of women going without stockings has received tacit approval from some Paris couturiers, who have launched a style of women's socks. For winter, there will be high spats to go without stockings for the chilly blasts of winter.

LONDON HOTEL MEN WELCOME TOURISTS

Every Effort Being Made to Make Pleasure Resorts Attractive

LONDON, May 10.—(LP)—The American tourist trade now is practically recognized as an "industry" in Great Britain.

London West-end cabarets and hotels already are arranging their programs for the tourist season. Every effort is being made to make the London pleasure resorts as attractive for American tourists as those on the Continent.

Keen competition has developed among hotel, night club keepers and cabarets to have the most enticing "show in town" as an attraction for American dollars.

Not only is the best British and Continental talent being engaged in many cases, at salaries running into four figures a week, but the best entertainment talent that America has is being introduced into England for the summer season. Several well known dancing couples are expected to shortly arrive from America, for already the first groups of tourists are arriving.

So far as the hotels are concerned the slogan has become "American luxuries for Americans. The fact that they are usually three times American prices is not added.

To cater to the American tourist trade, Great Britain has surpassed anything ever done before in hotel accommodations. A new hotel was recently constructed in the fashionable Mayfair district to cater especially to American tourists during the summer season. MODIFICATION IS FAVORED BY WOMEN

Members of National Republican Club Give Surprising Answers

NEW YORK, May 10.—(LP)—Members of the Women's National Republican club, answering a questionnaire, have declared themselves in favor of modification, amendment or repeal of the prohibition law. They believe crime has increased with the 18th amendment.

Thirty-three states were represented by the replies, 3000 members of the Women's National Republican club having been asked to state their views.

Of 960 answers received and published in the current issue of "Guidon," the official organ of the club, 853, or 88 per cent, declare in favor of a change. The law as it stands satisfied 107 of those who filled out the questionnaire.

"Guidon" tabulates the initial results as follows: 594 favor modification of the Volstead act to permit sale of light wines and beers; 636 favor sale of liquor under government control; 516 favor repeal of the 18th amendment, and substitution of local option; 335 favor any change and voted for all three alternatives; 817 think public morals have not been improved by prohibition; 124 think they have been improved; 863 think respect for the law has decreased; 62 think it has increased; 629 think sale of liquor has increased; 233 think it has decreased; 625 think drinking has increased; 198 think it has decreased; 769 think crime has increased with prohibition; 109 think it has decreased.
