U. work in the early days in Ashland and how the women started in by visiting what they called a "tired six", where they went, took possession of the glass and spent the afternoon knitting. Mrs. Russell stated that at that time there wasn't one church in Ashland that would

allow a temperance speaker to slide its door. Grandma Parr also spoke on the temperance conditions in the early days and gave two readings, "Thank God my Child is Resting," and a Mother's Day poem.
