Informed the United States state department that departure of the American Bellanca plane for Paris at this time might be "misunderstood and misinterpreted."

He denied that his cable to the state department was caused by fear that American fliers might receive a hostile reception if they arrived here at the conclusion of a New York to Paris flight.

His reason for postponement a few days was given, he said, as a matter of good taste in the national mourning for Nungesser and Coll.

Ambassador Herricks suggestion that such an attempt at this time might be misinterpreted was discounted by Lloyd Bertaud and Clarence Chamberlain, pilots of the Bellanca plane.

"In a sense, our flight will be a tribute to Nungesser and Coll," said Bertaud. "They were our comrades in the service of aeronautics which knows no national limitations."
