Indians Seek to Identify Body

THE DALLES, May 13.—Indians today started an investigation among scattered representatives of different tribes here for the spring fishing season which is supposed to show that the body taken from the Columbia river yesterday by Klickitat county, Washington, Coroner F. A. Smith was that of Tommy Penpat, Warm Springs Indian drowned below Celilo Falls last September.

The body was recognized as posed that identification was impossible, and the only hope of the natives lay in finding some one who could recognize the scraps of clothing left on the body. The corpse was buried yesterday near Spedis, Indian fishing villages on the Washington side of the river near The Dalles.
