A demented farmer's revenge for foreclosure of "the mortgage on the home place" is pictured above—the dynamite-torn wreckage of the consolidated school at Bath, Mich., in which 36 children and five adults were killed. Andrew Kahoe, treasurer of the school board, fired the bullet that set off charges of dynamite in his automobile, which in turn exploded a stock of dynamite in the school basement. Kahoe himself was killed in the blasts. Rescue crews of firemen and volunteers are pictured carrying fallen timbers and pulling down hanging walls in the search for more victims.

"LUCKY" ASKS TO BE ALONE

"Gee, I haven't seen Paris yet," says Ashland pilot.

WASHINGTON, May 24.—(AP)—"Lucky" Lindbergh can have a vacation in his home. Naval authorities have been instructed to defer his naval transportation for himself and plane. White House announcements said today.

Like many another impressionable American youngster, Capt. Charles Lindbergh would like to take a look around Paris without his official chaperon.

Official receptions, handshaking, speech-making, and such filling the day. The Cross of the Legion of Honor adorned his breast.

All this was very exciting and gratifying, Lindbergh told the United Press. He was fresh and unspoiled after the round of receptions and honors and accepting them with the same cheerful spirit with which he faced the press.

He of America beams in his speech-making flight from New York to Paris, but there obviously was something in the back of his mind. He confided:

"Gee, I haven't seen very much of Paris, not at all."

Lindbergh put all the emphasis on the word "not" as he told this to the United Press correspondent, amidst a constant turmoil of congratulations. He indicated he was torn between a desire to prolong his stay in the French capital and his eagerness to return home.

Told that many Parisians, eager for a glimpse of the hero of the hour, were complaining that he was being kept virtually a prisoner at the American embassy, Lindbergh admitted:

"Well, I would like to be alone in Paris myself for a while."

Ambassador Herrick acted as his social secretary.

2 cups cornmeal 1 tablespoon Karo
