PLAYGROUND WORK STARTS

Irvin E. Vining Speaks at C. U. Forum—Pageant Ticket Sale Discussed

Ashland was the only city of Oregon represented at the recent meeting of the National Chamber and the Pan American Trade Union, held in Washington, D. C., Irvin E. Vining, president of the Oregon Chamber told members of the local organization when he spoke before the forum Tuesday noon.

That the ideal of American business has changed was evident, he said, from the theme of conference discussions. Instead of the slogan: "Competition is the life of business," the American ideal is now "Humanizing Business," or co-operation. Through cooperation an increase in production means an increase in buying power. This is possible in individuals and nations the speaker said.

Ashland Playground Miss Fay Carter, who will be in charge of Ashland's playground which opens tomorrow, presented the playground work to the members. "More than 9000 children were at the Ashland playground last year and we believe that we gave these children something much more than mere entertainment. The more than 100 boys and girls who visited the playground daily were directed in constructive play," Miss Carter said.

Visitors from all sections of the United States were generous in their praise of the playground in Lithia park. With an ideal location, the playground has every chance of developing into one of the biggest Ashland institutions, Miss Carter said.

WASHINGTON—A truly national celebration for Charles Lindbergh is planned when he returns to the United States.

The president has named a special committee of cabinet members to plan the celebration, making it clear that he wished Lindbergh to be his guest at the White House and, if he doesn't arrive soon enough to visit him in Washington, to be his guest at the summer White House in the Black Hills of South Dakota.

LONDON, (AP)—Charles Lindbergh announced today he would leave Cherbourg, France Saturday on the U. S. Destroyer Brock, arriving in New York June 14th.

FLOOD RELIEF WORKER DIES

Former Oregon Man Perishes in Airplane Crash in Louisiana

NEW ORLEANS, La., (AP)—The body of Earl Kilpatrick, assistant director of disaster relief work for the Red Cross who was killed in an airplane crash late yesterday, will be shipped to Portland, Oregon, for burial.

At St. Louis, it will be turned over to his widow and four children who will accompany the body to Portland. Kilpatrick was a former dean of the extension school at the University of Oregon was graduated from that university. He was also superintendent of the Salem schools for three years. He was instantly killed when his plane transporting him from Memphis to New Orleans crashed.

KELLY MUST GO TO PEN

Whitefaced Juvenile Sentenced to Serve from one to 10 Years

LOS ANGELES, Cal., (AP)—Paul Kelly, young screen actor, faced Judge Charles Burnett here today to hear a motion for a new trial, which was denied, and received a sentence of from one to 10 years in San Quentin for the

bare-knuckle killing of Ray Raymond in an alleged fight over the affection of Dorothy Mackays, Raymond's wife.

Kelley was whitefaced and trembled as he heard himself branded as a heedless youth by Judge Burnett, who also gave the prison board instructions to notice his clandestine love affairs with Dorothy Mackays. Defense Attorney Gilbert filed a motion of appeal. Kelley was convicted of manslaughter in the trial in connection with Raymond's death.

Breaks of the game were with the Portland team throughout. Scores of the weekend games tell only the results of the contests and nothing of the splendid work done by the local team.
