City Gets Ambulance

New Limousine Type Car Purchased from Los Angeles Company

Ashland Community hospital is to have a new limousine ambulance to replace the old ambulance which several months ago was traded in on a truck for the city water department.

The new ambulance, which is being purchased from a Los Angeles company, is a slightly used \$5,000 car, which the city is securing for \$1,000, according to Mayor C. H. Pierce. City councilmen have not yet officially authorized the purchase of the new car, but have indicated their approval of the purchase. Delivery will be made within the next month.

When the old ambulance was traded in on the truck for the water department, the \$225 allowed on the old car, was credited to the water fund and this will be applied on the purchase of the new ambulance.

The new car has a six cylinder Continental engine, leather upholstery and mahogany finish.

Man Is Held On Drunkenness

Thomas Moore, 40, formerly of Cottage Grove, is held in the county jail to await hearing on motor law violations. Moore has several charges against him, one of operating a car without a driver's license, another of drunkenness, another of operating a car without proper license plates.

Moore was arrested near midnight Saturday when found by State Traffic Officer C. P. Talent, while sleeping in a battered old Ford roadster, three and a half miles north of town.

Several days ago Moore was injured in an automobile accident in Silverton, and his left hand was badly cut. He is being given medical care for this injury.

23 Year-old George Souders Wins National Classic With 97 Mile Speed

SPEEDWAY, Indianapolis, Ind. June 1.—(AP)—A 23-year-old youth, hitherto unknown, stuck doggedly to his grim task and leaped into fame by winning the 15th Annual Memorial Day 500-mile race here. America's major automobile classic.

George Souders, of Lafayette, Ind., until three years ago an engineer student at Purdue university, who got his racing experience on the dirt tracks of Northern Indiana flashed first across the finish line in the great international event, three laps ahead of Earl Devore.

Twelve drivers of the original 33 starters still were in the race when Souders' Puesenberg ended the terrific grind in five hours.
