FLIGHT ENDS NEAR BERLIN, GAS GONE
(Continued from Page 1)

the Bellanca plane had been flying for 35 hours, this exceeding the time of Lindbergh's flight to Paris by an hour and a half.

At 9:10 p. m. the airplane passed over Plymouth, England flying at a height of 12,000 feet. The Columbia was seen over the Channel islands at 11:30 p. m., heading for Cherbourg and Paris.

Berlin was ready to receive the flyers. So was Paris. So was Rome.

American Ambassador, Schuerman at Berlin was advised by cable from Levine's attorneys that the German capital would be the Columbia's objective if it reached Europe.

President Hindenburg of Germany sat up late awaiting word of the plane's coming.

In Rome, the Fascist government prepared a reception.

Apparently fair weather was favoring the little monoplane, for it was gaining steadily upon the time made by Lindbergh's "Spirit of St. Louis" at its nearest the continent. The slow speed at the start was due to the Columbia's load of fuel, but as the plane lightened and climbed to higher altitudes, favoring winds were on its tail.

There was an element of sportsmanship connected with the dash of the Columbia toward its European goal unsuspected until the little monoplane actually was under way.

Charles A. Levine, its owner, who had been called a poor sport because of his quarrel with Lloyd Berland, originally engaged to pilot the plane, climbed into the cockpit a moment before the take-

visitors from the air. While every resident of the German capital, from the humblest citizen to President Paul Von Hindenburg himself watched for word from Clarence Chamberlin and Charles A. Levine and their Bellanca monoplane, feverish activity continued at the Tempelhof airfield where the plane Columbia might come.

President Von Hindenburg eagerly awaited all reports of the American plane. He instructed his secretaries to keep him informed of the Columbia's progress and stated that he would receive Chamberlin and Levine immediately upon their arrival. He will be unable to go to Tempelhof air-

field if they arrive at night, but hopes to see the landing if it is made Monday morning.

What "Slim" Said

Captain Charles A. Lindbergh, en route home to receive the plaudits of millions of Americans, passed within 10 miles of Clarence Chamberlin and Charles A. Levine, who circled their monoplane over the giant Cunard Mauretania as they pressed on toward Europe.

So close was the Memphis to the Mauretania that the smokestacks of the larger vessel were plainly
