Co-operation of the public in this work is essential. The fire chief does not ask you to clean up a fire trap, just to exert his own authority. He asks you to clean up those fire traps as a preventative . against the monster which has caused such great property losses in the past.

To recognize the value of fire prevention and co-operation in preaching the essentials of this prevention, and in observing them, is the duty of every citizen.


