GROUNDS PREPARED FOR BIG FESTIVAL

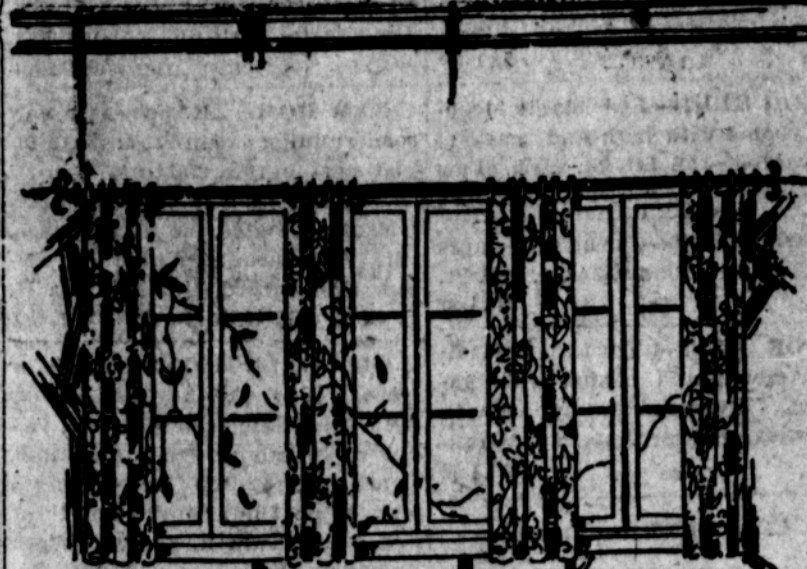
Assisted by City Engineer F. H. Walter and Clyde Malone, superintendent of the city light department, Southern Oregon Normal school people are starting the
