SECOND SPRAY NEEDED SOON

County Agent Advises Orchard Men In Fight Of Codling Moth

The ten day or second cover spray for codling moth should be applied within the next week or ten days.

The peak of first brood worms will be reached about the fifteenth of this month and all apples and pears should be thoroughly protected.

Arsenate of lead, three pounds of dry arsenate, the one hundred gallons of water is recommended. Spray thoroughly covering all leaves and branches as well as fruit, paying particular attention to the tops of trees.
