Some Cooking Hints

When the Forgetting's on The Wedding Cake

What foods should be served for the wedding repast? How should the wedding cakes be baked and served? These who are facing these troublesome problems in planning for the wedding may welcome helpful suggestions.

Besides the wedding cakes, light delicate goods such as those in the menus given below are usually served for the wedding breakfast or reception. They may also be served at showers and parties preceding the wedding.

Bride's Cake
The white bride's cake to be cut at the table, contains the following and is made as follows:

- 1 cup shortening
- 2 cups sugar
- 1 teaspoon almond or vanilla extract

Whites of six eggs
3-4 cups milk
3 1-2 cups flour
3 teaspoons cream of tartar baking powder

Beat shortening to a cream, adding sugar gradually; add flavoring extract; beat until smooth. Add alternately, a little at a time, milk and flour which have been sifted three times with baking powder. Beat whites of eggs until very light and add to batter, folding in very gently without beating. Bake in a round greased loaf pan in a moderate oven at 325 degrees F. about one hour.

Cover the cake with ornamental frosting. The decorations may be the tiny candy ornament found in confectioners' shops or rose leaves and other designs worked out with ornamental frosting made as follows:

- 1-2 cups granulated sugar
- 1-2 cup water
- 2 egg whites
- 1 teaspoon flavoring extract
- 1 teaspoon cream of tartar baking powder.

Boil sugar and water without stirring until syrup spins a thread
