FATAL THREE TO FIGURE IN PROSECUTION

—in which later was found the registered letter receipt which had been issued to Roy or Ray D'Autremont—and other articles which will be used as evidence.

He also recounted the actions of the D'Autremont boys previous to the train holdup, relating many incidents which he stated the prosecution would prove would link the D'Autremonts with the atrocious crime. Most of these, according to his allegations, were in connection with Ray and Roy D'Autremont.

He traced their alleged movements, at the Silver Falls lumber camp, where they are said to have remained until August previous to the holdup; then to Portland, where Roy is said to have purchased a Nash car and where persons claimed to have been the D'Autremonts, purchased pots, pans and other paraphernalia, which he said would be proved was identical with the found near the scene of the holdup.

He told of target practicing by the D'Autremonts and said this was the same type of ammunition that had been used in the holdup. He also said the sombrero hat which Roy had worn before the holdup would be identified as the one seen on one of the robbers in the tunnel. The gun used in the holdup, Mr. Roberts claimed, would be identified as the one Ray D'Autremont had purchased under an alias.

The alleged conversation at the conference between Hugh at the Alcatraz prison and his mother was emphasized by Prosecutor Roberts. In this Mrs. D'Autremont is said to have urged her son to tell everything, but he is said to have replied that he had a weird story to tell and that with the aid of a good lawyer, he should be freed of the charge.

J. O. Merritt, railroad train conductor who was in charge of the Southern Pacific train No. 13,

which was dynamited and held up, was the first witness called by the state. He told of his connection with the incidents in the tunnel when the train was held up, his discovery of the dead bodies and the handling of the train following the holdup.

His testimony was continued at the resumption of court after the noon recess.

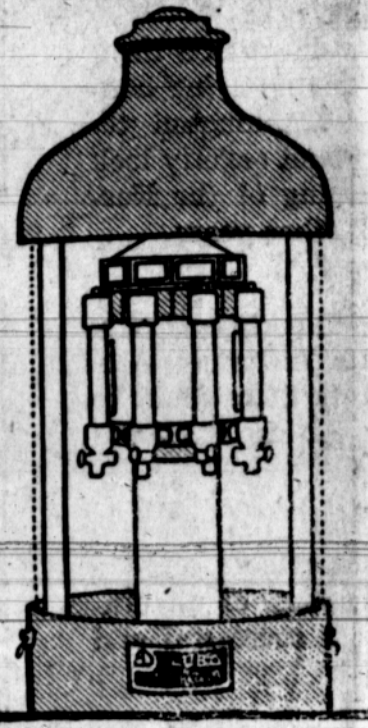
Banker Gives Success Rules
