When Mother Came Mrs. Lindbergh, trying to arrive secretly, unexpectedly left her train at Baltimore Friday morning, but she was soon discovered and finally was brought to Washington in an automobile Friday afternoon and drove up to the temporary White House on DuPont circle duly acclaimed by an applauding crowd.

President Coolidge was notified of Mrs. Lindbergh's arrival as soon as the automobile arrived at the temporary White House at 4:40. He left the executive offices by motor and made a quick trip to greet her.

Mrs. Lindbergh was greeted at the door of the temporary White House by Irvin Hoover, chief usher. Mrs. Coolidge waited inside for her guest, who graciously posed for a small army of photographers about five minutes. She seemed embarrassed at the thought of 500 gathered around the house and at the crowd of press and photograph representatives but she smiled pleasantly while the cameras clicked.

OFFICERS PLAN REMOVAL

Armory Will Be Used As Temporary Court House - Packing Started

The Medford Armory has been rented for the temporary Jackson county court house and Jackson county officials are now packing up their equipment and everything which can be moved, preparatory to the change the first of the month.

This arrangement was made several days ago. The city of Medford is paying \$200 a month rental for the armory. The main auditorium and rooms on the ground floor will be used by the sheriff and county clerk, partitions of beaver board being put in to provide separate offices.

Sheriff Jennings will also have an office in the basement of the building as will the county health unit.

The County Assessor is to occupy the present American Legion

room on the second floor and the treasurer will have the present supply room on the same floor.

The county superintendent and county engineer will have quarters opposite the present American Legion room.

All valuable records are to remain in the fireproof vault at Jacksonville for the present.

Medford in addition to providing the armory, will have a night watchman and janitor on duty 24 hours of each day.

now the main one of the Normal School. When the building was not quite completed it was learned that the Portland University had undertaken too much in the way of land purchase and construction of buildings at home and would not be able to keep up its agreement with the Ashland people in the promised indentment, so the work stopped with the buildings not quite complete inside and no furnishings. The edifice stood for more than a year with door openings nailed over with boards. The Grants Pass Lumber Co. held a lien on it for \$3000 for material furnished.

"In June 1895 Prof. W. T. VanScoy came here from the Drain State Normal and proposed to the old Normal board of trustees to reopen the Normal school in the new building on the Boulevard, and to call the school the Southern Oregon Normal State School. The proposition was accepted by the board. The charter of the old Normal was still in force, and the school could be reopened in any building. The new

name was made a permanent one of the school by a legislative act of 1899. The Southern Oregon State Normal School was opened the first Monday of September, 1895. The debt of \$3000, was paid with money received from the sale of the old Normal building and grounds to the city school board, who wanted the same for high school purposes. Then funds were raised by the citizens with which to furnish the new building on the Boulevard. The first faculty of the new school in its new quarters consisted of W. T. VanScoy, president; I. E. Vining, instructor in Literature, history and elocution; J. J. Berry, teacher of mathematics and astronomy; J. W. Storms, teacher of natural sciences; T. W. Miles, principal of the commercial department; Julia Fielder in charge of the training school; Ada P. Thomas, teacher of music; Mrs. Angle L. Engle, teacher of drawing and painting. The only fund for the running expenses of the school for the four years was tuition from students and this furnished the teachers an average salary of \$200 a year, after incidental expenses were deducted. Several times the citizens of Ashland pulled the school over hard places in the way of necessary fixtures, hay and wood. Mr. R. P. Nell furnished the four horses each year in order to keep the big buses going. No charge for their use. We could name two score of loyal citizens who helped to sustain the school in every crisis; among these is Hon. E. V. Carter, who not only aided liberally in every time

of need, but obtained the first appropriation for the Normal and was in some way connected with the securing of every succeeding appropriation obtained for the school.

"The old Board of Regents consisted of Gov. W. P. Lard, Secretary of State H. R. Kincaid, Supt. of Public Instruction, G. M. Irwin, James Thornton, E. D. Briggs, G. F. Billings, F. H. Carter, D. R. Mills, F. Roper, W. H. Leeds, G. S. Butler, R. P. Nell. The first Board of Regents after the school received its first appropriation was Gov. T. Geer, Sec. of State, F. I. Dunbar, Supt. of Public Instruction, J. H. Ackerman, G. A. Gregory, H. C. Kinney, F. H. Carter, G. E. Harmon, L. F. Willis, W. A. Massingill, J. S. Orre, A. J. Sherwood, R. P. Nell.

"The first year, 1895-6, the Normal enrolled 133 students in the Normal department, and the graduating class numbered 23. This first class was made up of Juniors from the Drain Normal and graduates from the Ashland, Medford and Grants Pass high schools. The State Normal diplomas at that time and up to 1899 were good as teaching certificates in any country or state. The first appropriation in 1899 was \$7500, and the last in 1907 was \$40,000.

"The presidents of the Normal since its location on the Boulevard are W. T. VanScoy, W. M. Clayton, B. F. Mulkey, C. A. Payne, H. M. Shafer, J. A. Churchill. The past has been a period of struggle for the school. We believe that the voice of the people will establish the Normal in the near future to be a fixture for generations to come."

Mr. Braden was met in Medford by Secretary J. H. Fuller and brought to Ashland where he met Miss Fay Carver at the Children's Playground and examined the equipment and work being conducted there. He was escorted over the entire city by Mr. Fuller, viewing the Park from all the high points also the Springs and bath.

A trip was made to the Ashland Golf Course where Mr. Braden was introduced to a group of Ashland people. Mr. Braden stated that although he frequently passed through on the train this was his first stop at the city, and that henceforth he should be a most enthusiastic booster for Ashland. Drinking sulphur water at Helman Baths and Lithia water in the Park, he said, "These are wonderful waters, I like them."
