Earl Miller, 23 years old, of Wolf Creek, was instantly killed Thursday, when his hand was caught in a belt on the rock crusher operated by Von der Hellen and Pierson, 14 miles below Prospect on the Crater Lake highway, and his head was crushed in the heavy machinery. According to Deputy Corner J. A. Walker of Medford, death was entirely accidental and no inquest will be held. The body has been taken to Wolf Creek where the funeral will be held. Miller is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Miller, one brother and two sisters.

**SHERIFF OFF FOR OHIO TO BRING TWINS**

Autremont twins to his mother in New Mexico.

While it is said Hugh has not been in any way connected with either the knapsacks or the overalls, the state contends it will prove that they are material evidence, in connection with a conspiracy in which they allege Hugh participated in the blowing up and robbery of the Southern Pacific train.

Mr. Bonderson testified he was, and had been at the time of the holdup, a section foreman on the Southern Pacific with his residence at Siskiyou; that he was present shortly after the holdup; that he entered the tunnel; that he followed the course of the insulated wire which he found just

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outside the tunnel, finding at the end of the wire the articles mentioned above; that he guarded these until the arrival of Deputy Sheriff Fornbrook, who took possession of them.

The showing of the three knapsacks was the first example of the application of the Rule Three, which Special Prosecutor Roberts had predicted would play an important part in the state's attempt to prove that the three D'Autremont boys conspired to hold up the S. P. train.

When cross-examined by Defense Attorney Collier, Mr. Bonderson stated nobody had told him to mark any of the articles which he had found, and which were introduced as testimony. He did not explain why he had marked some with his initials, while leaving the others—the most important ones—unmarked.

Mr. Bonderson caused momentary merriment in the court room when, during the examination by Attorney Roberts, he whipped out a knife and large plug of tobacco, calmly slipping a huge portion of the plug in his mouth. Mr. Roberts asked the court for a few seconds' intermission until "the witness had completed his lunch."

Wm. Flackus, of Ashland, who is construction foreman and who was at Siskiyou during the holdup testified he had found the insulated wire wrapped around the "breaking rod" on the rear of the engine, next to which was the mail coach with its gapping end where the explosion had played havoc, whereas Bonderson, who had said Flackus was with him, had testified he had found the end of the wire outside the tunnel. This was apparently an unimportant mixup in time of entering the tunnel, it seemed.

Flackus said he and his gang entered the tunnel from the west end, having climbed over the top of the tunnel, which seemed obstructed, and that he entered the mail car with the fire extinguishing outfit. He said they located a fire about the middle of the mail car.

L. F. Fornbrook, who was deputy sheriff in this county at the time of the holdup, was the first witness after lunch. The various

articles which have been exhibited as evidence were turned over to him, as he happened to be the first officer on the scene after the hold-up.

Defense Attorneys this morning again emphasized that they wanted to reserve the right to file objections to the various articles entered this morning as testimony unless they were shown to be directly incriminating against the defendant. The state Attorneys said they would prove by these articles that Hugh participated in the explosion and holdup of the train, thereby killing four men.

The first witness this morning was W. R. Wilson, of Chicago, Ill., a civil engineer who was employed by the Southern Pacific at the time of the Siskiyou holdup, who gave the jury a vivid picture of the scene of the S. P. train dynamiting. He presented maps and blueprints, showing the locations of the bodies of the men murdered

ed in the atrocious crime and also the location of many of the points about the tunnel, which mark where many of the exhibits were found.

Present at the trial today, occupying seats in the front of the court room, were Mrs. Seng, wife of the fireman who was killed, and Mrs. Rollie Rinebarger, formerly Mrs. Daugherty, wife of the mail clerk who was blown to pieces in the explosion. Mrs. Seng's mother was also present.

Mr. D'Autremont was not present at the morning session of the trial. The excitement in connection with the capture of the D'Autremont twins in Ohio seemed to have subsided, and the defendant and his mother were calmer this

morning than they had been the last two days, presumably because it appeared certain the capture of the two brothers would not in any way affect Hugh's trial.
