The rose city was all dressed for the real party which is to continue all week. The streets are gaily bedecked with banners. Police inspection and parade was the opening event. Miss Dorothy Mielke, queen of the festival, and the seven princesses rode the royal barge to Laurelhurst park for coronation at 2 p. m. The Rosaria, the pageant in which the history of the rose is traced, is to have its opening performance tonight. The floral parade is scheduled for Thursday afternoon.

others were there also making a search. Maps of the tunnel and vicinity were exhibited. Moore was asked by defense if they were equipped with revolvers, and he said they had been, but that to his knowledge the guardsmen had done no shooting. The state had brought out that the trees were marked with bullet holes, presumably made by the holdup men. Rawles Moore, Medford attorney, who was district attorney in 1923, identified a gun which he said had been handed to him at the tunnel, although he stated no marks had been made on the pistol in his presence. F. M. Stratton, Weed, Cal., testified to having found a cap one mile south of west portal. He said the cap looked like one he had found. A black grip was introduced and witness said as far as he could tell this was the same grip he had found near the cap, although he admitted there was nothing about the grip by which he could positively identify the article. J. C. Beagle, Ashland, who was sent by district attorney to investigate, said he identified cap and bags as ones he saw at tunnel, and marked same thereon by one of the men assisting in the investigation. However, he said he did not see this man place the marks on the grip. Roy Parr, deputy game warden of Ashland, said the grip looked like the same one he saw at the tunnel, but positively identified the cap by initials in it, J. B. The attorneys at this point did a little squabbling, which added a little excitement to an otherwise listless session. F. A.
