**NEW COURSES FOR LOCAL NORMAL SCHOOL**  
(Continued From Page One)  
The course in rural school music will be given by Miss Leona G. Marsters, the regular instructor in this subject. During the course Miss Marsters plans to emphasize problems in music incidental to the rural school.  
The course in school administration will be given by A. C. Strange, who has had 20 years experience in this field. Miss Beatrice Hall, instructor in health education, plans to devote considerable time to the problems of the health of the rural child.  
Problems of administration of junior high schools will be considered in separate courses. Miss E. Virginia Hales, instructor in physical education, plans not only to give her students the regular work along this line, but will also conduct classes in horsemanship and will probably organize at least one rifle team. Much enthusiasm has been shown during the year for this phase of the work and it is planned to continue it into the summer session.  
Several lectures and entertainments have been scheduled for the summer session, among them being Dr. A. M. Harping, P. H. D., from the University of Arkansas, who will conduct a series of lectures on astronomy. Plans are being made to secure at least one performance of a dramatic character.  
Last year the enrollment for the summer session was well over 200 and, in as much as an increased enrollment is expected this summer, ample accommodations are being arranged. The summer session opens June 20th, and continues for 12 weeks, being divided into two six week periods.

**TESTIMONY OF PURCHASE OF AUTO GIVEN TODAY**  
(Continued From Page One)  
S. L. Dillard, American Railway express employee who was at scene of holdup within 30 minutes, under questioning by prosecution identified some of the articles. No cross examination.  
John E. Perl, coroner in 1923, of Medford, said he conducted the inquest in Ashland and that he identified the body of Coyle Johnson when it was recently exhumed.  
H. G. McCarty, Dunsmuir, the thirteenth witness, explained the workings of the air-brakes on that train. No cross examination.  
John D. Terrill, sheriff here in 1923, who was not here at time of holdup, said he had not found anything, but had made an investigation and identified many articles as those given him by other officials.  
In anticipation of new testimony being given, the crowd had materially increased Monday afternoon, with every indication that a crowded courtroom would be experienced this week in contrast to the small crowds which have been attending the previous sessions in this trial.  
In order to rush along the trial, the court continued until 5:45 P. M. in the hearing of testimony. Everybody seems to be anxious to complete the case in order to avoid any possibility of having to transfer the activities to Medford July 1st, when Jacksonville will cease to be the county seat of Jackson County.  
It will be remembered that the defense entered a vigorous protest against the conduct of the re-trial, contending that under the legislative act creating Medford as the county seat, the trial was being held illegally, as they claimed the emergency clause in the legislative act automatically made Medford the county seat.  
This objection was overruled by the court.  
Former Sheriff Terrill was still on the stand this morning, but he was replaced within a few minutes by C. D. Welter, postoffice inspector, who testified he had found a portion of an express tag underneath the pine bough bed, which he identified by his initials.  
Under cross examination, he stated the bed had not been disturbed and testified on other minor details.  
Patrick Sweeney, sergeant of the railroad police, told of having found a pepper can about 25 feet from the detonating battery in the mountains two weeks after the holdup. Under cross examination, he said he did not know anything about it when Attorney Collier reminded him that several had previously searched without finding the can.  
Henry J. Lockwood, employed by Schwabacher Hardware company in October 1923, testified that pistol bearing Number 130,763 had been shipped to Hauser Bros. in Albany, March 24, 1922. Pistol found on the mountain had previously been found to bear the above number.  
Paul Hauser, Albany sporting goods dealer, identified invoice from Seattle firm for pistol. He said he did not know date of sale of that pistol and that he hadn't seen invoice since it had been given to Coturri, an S. P. officer.  
J. S. Bonwell, salesman for Hauser, showed record of pistol sale, which gave information that purchaser of gun was five feet six inches and identified record showing signature of William Elliott, of Eugene, who purchased the gun.  
The cross examination was: "When did you leave employ of Hauser Bros., and where did you go when you left there?" Ans.: "To work for S. P. and worked for them a year."  
"Was there anything unusual about this sale?" Ans.: "No."  
"Did you date the receipt of this sale?" Ans.: "No."  
"Was it your custom to date all receipts when firearms were sold?" Ans.: "Yes."  
"Then, why didn't you date this particular receipt?" You said at the last trial that all receipts were dated when weapon was sold. Didn't you say at the last trial that a date placed at the top of the receipt did not mean anything as far as you were concerned; that you didn't know anything about it?" Ans.: "Yes."  
But since the last trial, who have you talked with to make you change your testimony? Did you talk with Coturri and Chandler, S. P. investigators?" Ans.: "Yes."  
"Did you keep any records in store of sales, not required by law?" state's attorneys asked him. "Yes." Record introduced and identified by witness, as he had signed it.  
E. G. Ervine, clerk for express company, identified record kept by company showing that person to whom express was shipped came in person and received the goods. This record was signed by R. A. D'Autremont. Black grip was shipped from Eugene to Portland and was received by R. A. D'Autremont, who did not give any address to which the grip could be delivered, but came for it himself.  
The numbers on express sticker on bottom of grip corresponded with number on shipping bill and bill of receipt, testimony showed.  
Walter S. Wright, Portland express employe, testified along the same line. A. F. Stowe, Portland automobile salesman said a contract for car had been signed by R. A. D'Autremont and negotiations for sale occurred August 29, 1923. He said two persons came the first time, but that three came the second time. Two were stockily built, but the third was not, he testified. The latter drove the car away, he said. When asked if he knew the names of the two besides the one who made the purchase, he answered, "No."  
He said the application for a license was made out by E. E. James of Silverton, height five feet six inches; color of hair, brown; color of eyes, blue; occupation, painter. The application, which he said was made by the youngest of the trio, was identified.
