SLIM TALKS
 NEW YORK, June 15 (AP)—Charles Lindbergh today pleaded before a joint luncheon of the state Chamber of Commerce and

"Until you put your identification mark on these pellets, was there anything that would distinguish them from the hundreds of other shells put out?" defense asked. "No."

H. P. Love, spokesman of Eugene in 1923, identified two cartridges and a water-bag as having been sold to D'Autremont boys, as he had remembered sale because of fact boys asked about knapsacks they had laid aside, which they later bought. Later they bought another one. The third member of the party had on khaki clothes and a brown cap.

"Was the defendant this person?" "I can't say for sure, but he was the same size."

He said the other two were the twins. He identified three knapsacks as those he had sold the boys. Upon cross examination he said the knapsacks were not different from 12 others he had except they were a little darker.

"Did I understand you to say that you could not positively say this defendant was with these men in the store?" "Yes."

Joe E. Love, son of the preceding witness, said he completed the sale his father had started. He identified sales slip and three knapsacks, saying he remembered the sale particularly because his father had placed a bonus on the sale of one of the knapsacks which had become dusty on the store's shelves.

He replied he could not positively identify the third man, who did not take a part in the purchase, as the defendant. He learned the names of the other two from an S. P. official who brought the knapsacks to his store for identification.

The next witness, R. W. McCullough, of Eugene, in testifying that the twins and another man had purchased a large supply of raisins made some of the audience gossip about possibly unearthing a moonshine deal. He said he was not acquainted with defendant; said he had sold the pound can of pepper, the can being identified as one found in the Siskiyou. Purchase by the three men — consisted of large quantities of goods, such as \$4 worth of raisins and \$4 worth of walnuts, which made him remember the sale.

On cross examination he admitted his store was not the only one which had stocked the brand of pepper, such as in can found in Siskiyou, and there was nothing about the can by which he could identify it.

At noon today 55 witnesses had testified for the state, with no limitation when the state would rest its case. Considerable more interest was manifested in the case this morning by the audience, which however has never reached anything like the size of the audiences in the first trial.

sale for the pistol which the state has as exhibit in this trial. Original bill of sale has been lost, but Coturri said he had examined this before it was lost, although he had not made a copy, just a memorandum of this. Judge Thomas and defense attorneys had an argument about this question, which was stricken from the minutes. He told of tracing the Nash car, which it is alleged the D'Autremonts purchased in Portland to the boys' father's shed on October 18, 1923. No cross examination.

Stella Walters, Portland, who was the second woman to testify, said she had worked in her father's hardware store; that Coturri had brought articles to her to mark; that she remembered three boys had bought similar articles of her; that she remarked to them about wrapping the cups, but they said they were staying at the hotel over hardware store and did not want them wrapped.

Defense Attorney Collier picked up the two cups and asked the witness: "Do you mean to tell the jury that you sold anybody those cups?" "Are there any marks on them that you can identify?" "No," the witness replied. "Certainly, there are not," the attorney added, and threw the cups down with other exhibits, making a loud noise.

"Is there anything different about these two cups from the millions that are in every hardware store in the world?" "No."

A. E. Geromonte, employe of the Silverton Timber company of Silverton, Ore., was the next witness.
